Member Q&A

If I join the new EcoEnergy® Program and purchase renewable energy certificates, do I get a credit on my electric bill?



No, joining the EcoEnergy® Program is completely optional and would be in addition to your monthly electric bill. It would be billed on your monthly electric bill only for convenience. You may pay for a yearly purchase of RECs in one lump sum, if preferred. By purchasing renewable energy certificates (RECs), you are helping to defray the additional cost of generating electricity from new wind generation resources. For every kWh of electrical energy generated from a renewable energy generation resource, there is a kWh of electrical energy and one REC representing the environmental benefits of generating one kWh of renewable energy. Your purchase supports the construction and operation of projects like the new Crescent Ridge Wind Farm in Bureau County, Illinois.

Does the EcoEnergy® Program have a website?

Yes, visit www.adamselectric.coop and click on *EcoEnergy Program*.

What types of organizations will be supported by the new Penny Power Program?

The funds will be used to support groups that are organizing projects to benefit the community in and around Adams Electric Cooperative's service area. For example, an emergency assistance group might need CPR mannequins. Maybe a senior citizens' facility is building a wheel chair ramp. A local school may need computers. These are just a few possibilities. Once actual requests are received, distribution of funds will be voted upon by a group of advisory committee members and staff. No funds will be used for any political purpose. Funds will be distributed quarterly and the groups receiving funds and the amounts donated will be listed in the Adams Outlet.

A BIG THANK YOU to all of our members who have decided to remain in the Penny Power Program. As of today, we have 75% participation! Watch the Adams Outlet for future updates on the program.

Co-op Construction

Construction projects are at an all time high for the Cooperative. These construction projects represent the growth your Cooperative is experiencing. Economic growth and low unemployment rates are representative of the favorable conditions in West Central Illinois. The Cooperative purchased more kWh's in January and March of 2005 than it has for these months in any previous year.

The additional work load is spreading our employees pretty thin, but they have stepped up to the challenge. We are adjusting work assignments to keep up with current new construction and system improvements. The supervisors prioritize the work and utilize the work group as a whole to more efficiently manage the work load. It is not uncommon to have the tree trimming crew or part-time employees helping on work orders to meet the requests of our members. We are fortunate to have dedicated employees and experienced part-time workers to help during peak times. Safety is still the Cooperative's number one priority and we do not ask employees to do assignments they are not qualified to perform. As with any business, we try to maximize the efforts of our workforce to maintain high member satisfaction.

Two of the larger projects the Cooperative is currently building are a double circuit

three-phase line along State Street between 48th and 59th Street in Quincy and a three-phase line in southern Adams County from the Adams substation to east of Beverly.

The double circuit project will improve the reliability and transfer capabilities in the west part of Quincy. This new circuit will tie in to our new St. Anthony substation. The anticipated completion date on this project is June 1 prior to

summer loading. The Cooperative has been fortunate to have a large amount of load growth in this area.

The project in southern Adams County will be installed on a new transmission line that is being built by CCS/Soyland Cooperative. We will install our line on their new poles and eliminate a line that needs to be upgraded. This line is approximately twelve miles long and will be completed as time permits. This line will provide an additional transmission source to most of our substations in Adams County and should improve the reliability in the central to southern parts of Adams County and the southwestern part of Brown County.

The Cooperative is committed to providing its members with reliable electric service. The Cooperative wants to thank the members in these areas for working with us on these projects and for their patience as we build the new lines.

Fans appear at the ticket stand, a few here and there until a large band of people stretches into the parking lot. The groups trickle into the bleachers filling the stands. Crowds gather by the concessions grabbing porkchops, hotdogs and nachos. Some couples set up lawn chairs in the back behind the bleachers. Families set out pillows for little ones and everyone settles in for the evening.

You can hear the engines sputtering in the distance just beyond the track. Crews move hastily through the pits verifying last minute details and the drivers check in.

A few cars move on-to the track. Fans scoot to the edge of their seats. As the cars creep around the first

corner, you can feel a deep rumble in your chest.

After a few hotlaps, the announcer welcomes the crowd. The flag drops and the cars pick up speed. The rumbling becomes thunder.

For thirty years, fans have packed the stands at Quincy Raceways. It all began in 1975 when Albert Scott bought the property at 8000 Broadway to relocate his popular roller rink, Scotties Skateland. Skateland had been in business on North 12th Street in Quincy since 1936. To-

day, it's the longest running same family-operated skating rink in the country. Skateland was successful but the ground and location was bursting with opportunity. Having been a boat racing world champion, Albert had a love of racing. Why not expand the family business and bring a local race track to Quincy? That's just what he did. In July 1975, Albert Scott opened Quincy Raceways. Scotties Skateland was relocated next door to the track in 1979.

Today, Bob Scott, son of Albert Scott and Jeff, Bob's son, maintain the two businesses along with the help of about 60 part-time employees at Quincy Raceways and about 20 part-time employees at Scotties Skateland.

Over the years, the track has grown in popularity bringing in drivers from all around.

Nextel cup drivers Mike Wallace and Jamie McMurray frequented the track years ago. Wallace was a mechanic for one of the drivers and was track champion at one time. McMurray ran go-carts. Nas-car star Kenny Schrader still visits the track every year and can be seen on June 14 at the UMP Late Model Show.

Some drivers are quite dedicated to the raceway; such as Henry Delonjay, who hasn't missed a race in 21 years. "He's a very tough competitor," comments Bob. Henry or "Hank the Crank" as he's often referred, says, "Racing was born in me. I've always loved racing. My mom said I used to drive a plate around the house when I was little."

Obviously, Henry gets the award for perfect attendance every year. Drivers attend an awards banquet in the fall where they receive

trophies for points. Other awards have included hardest crash, oldest driver, youngest driver, fan favorite and best appearing car.

Randy Rigg, an employee of Adams Electric and a driver in the modified class comments, "The best part about being involved in racing is all the friends I've met over the years."

When the raceway first got started, three classes ran on Sunday nights. Today, the track hosts the usual late model, modified and bomber classes on Sunday nights along with several other major events on various evenings.

This year, fans can enjoy a boat race; drivers will haul boats around the track while trying to knock boats off competitors' trailers. "The last one still pulling a boat wins," explains Jeff.

The family owns 12 school buses that they will use for school bus races. "Some school buses will end up on their sides before the night's over," laughs Jeff.

The raceway will have its usual Monster Truck Jams and demolition derby. "We will also have a bus derby and are considering a

minivan derby for the fall," said Jeff. "We may also plan something for our 30th Anniversary in June or July," adds Bob.

Quincy Raceways has leased events such as go-carts, motorcycle races and an oval 4-wheeler race.

Fireworks will be shot off on Memorial Day, July 3rd and Labor Day.

Novelty events have included rollover contests, auto football and a wheelbarrow race. "We don't do the wheelbarrow races anymore. Drivers really got into it and were running over each other – it could get dangerous," explained Bob Scott. The auto football is played with an old cement dryer as the "football," which can be seen this year at the Labor Day *Eve of Destruction*.

The track has one of the biggest snack bars, bigger than most race tracks, "because I have to eat the food," adds Bob.

Quincy Raceways and Scotties Skateland are members of Adams Electric Cooperative. Bob Scott commented, "We've had backup generators the past 30 years. The power has been so reliable that we've never been out on a race night."

Between Quincy Raceways and Scotties Skateland, the Scott's are rarely home. "We're either at the office, on the track or at Skateland," Bob says showing his business card that reads, "Never" next to his home phone number. Although the Scott's both have homes next door, Bob and Jeff are very dedicated to operation.

Scotties Skateland has expanded over the years, adding six party rooms, doubling the size of the snack bar and pouring a concrete parking lot in 1999. Skateland is open year-round except in August when the rink closes for resurfacing. For more information on Scotties Skateland, call 217-222-3868.

Prices Rise

The price of gas at the pump will remain high through at least 2006, the Energy Information Administration reported.



Monthly average prices are projected to peak at about \$2.35 per gallon in May. Summer diesel fuel prices are expected to average \$2.24 per gallon, EIA said in

its 2005 Summer Motor Gasoline Outlook. Demand for gasoline will average 9.3 million barrels per day this summer, up 1.8 percent from summer 2004. Despite high prices, EIA said demand will rise because there are more drivers and vehicles on the road.

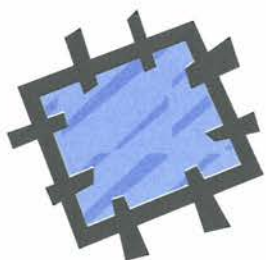

DuPont has received recognition for a synthetic fiber that is designed to be environmentally conscious and help reduce energy use.

DuPont™ Sorona® received the 2005 New Technologies in Renewable Materials and Processes award at the Global

Plastics and Environmental Conference in Atlanta. The polymer can be used for fibers, fabrics and floor coverings. DuPont has developed a method to produce the polymer from corn starch. Starting in 2006, the polymer will be partially produced from corn starch, requiring 40 percent less energy than it would from chemical-based materials.
