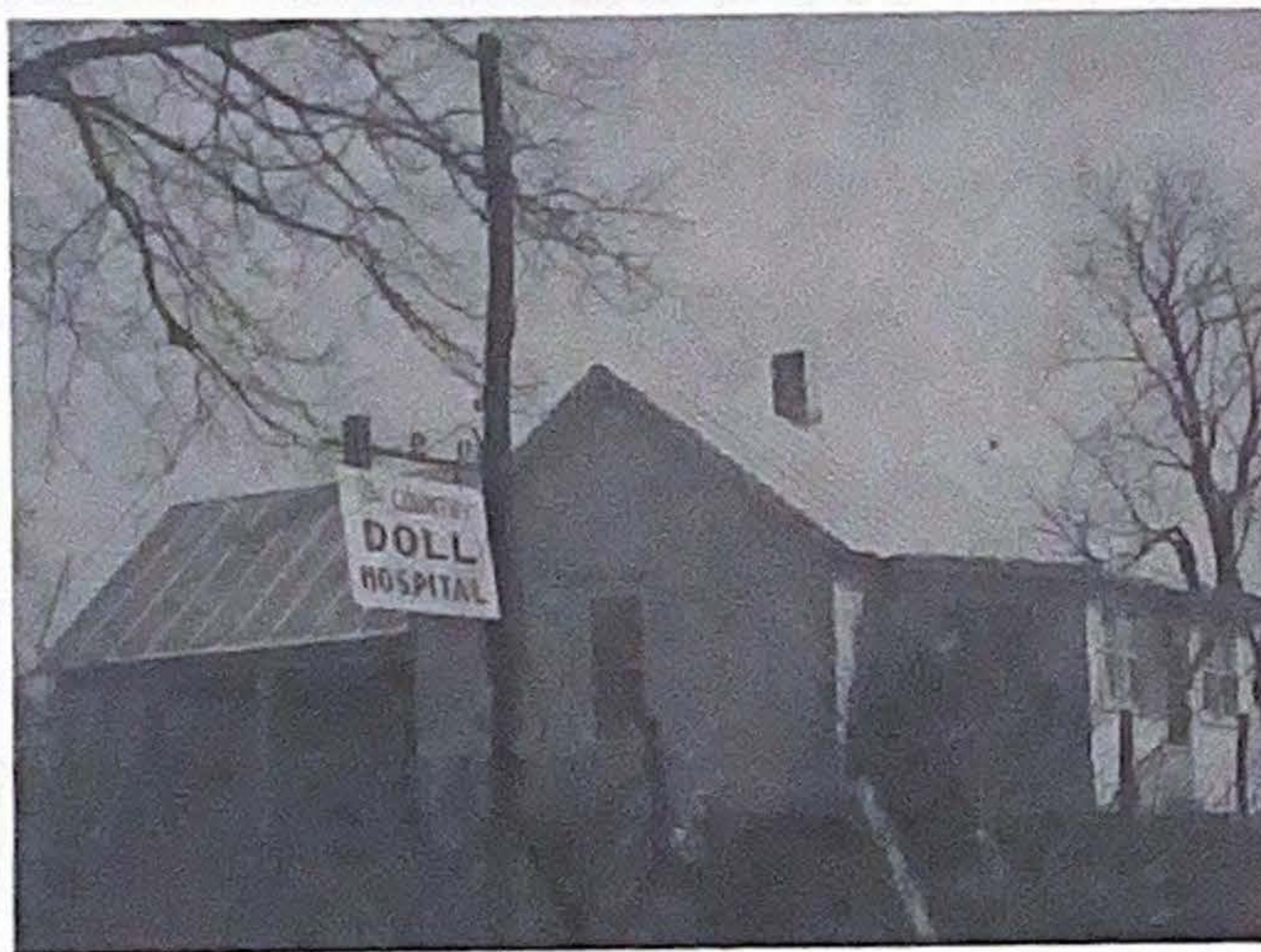

SEIZ COUNTRY DOLL HOSPITAL



Following surgery a year ago, Mrs. Henry Seiz (Siz) of Route 1, Barry, needed an interest or hobby to occupy her time during the period of recuperation. After taking a nine-month course from the Doll Hospital School, Los Angeles, California, Mrs. Seiz received her Certificate of Proficiency in Doll Technology. No doll repair job is too large or too small, and as a result of her training, no job is too difficult for Mrs. Seiz, who guarantees satisfaction in all her work.

Mrs. Seiz has several suppliers for replacement parts for dolls and, if parts are not available, she is experienced in making molds for broken parts. The molds are of latex rubber and the parts are molded of plaster of Paris or dental plastic, depending on the material used in the original part. She repairs all antique dolls and makes authentic clothes for them as well.

The most common repair jobs are to replace broken arms and legs; repair cracked surfaces; repaint faded or worn parts, and replace or repair the doll's hair. If necessary, Mrs. Seiz makes new wigs of human hair, or in the case of most modern dolls, maintains a stock of wigs of synthetic hair which can be washed and given a permanent.

In addition to the doll repairing, Mrs. Seiz does custom sewing and dress making. She is now taking a course in dress designing and dressmaking to expand her services further in that field.



SECURITY LIGHTING

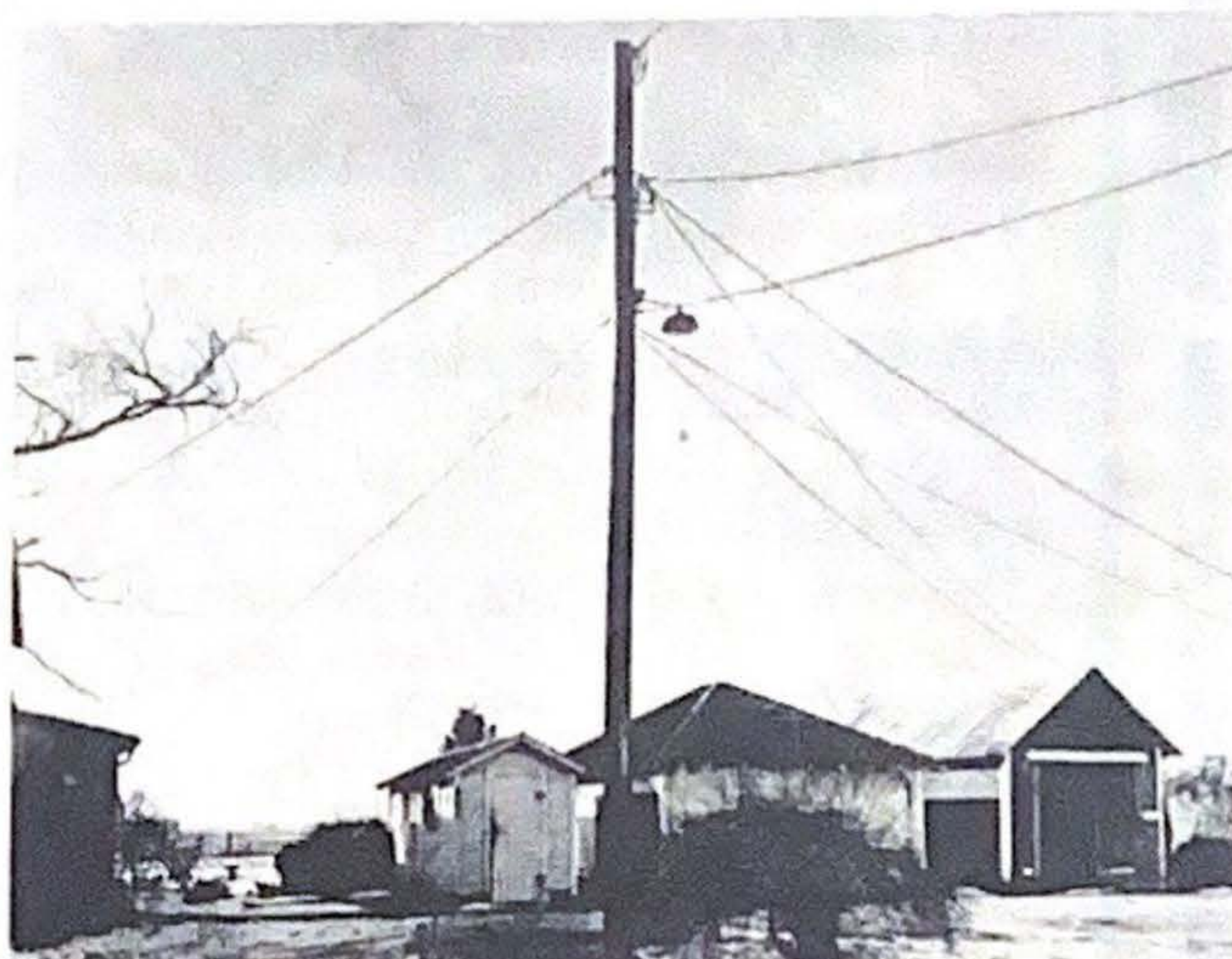

1961 4H ELECTRIC PROJECT SCHOOL

This year 59 girls and boys are participating in the Annual 4-H Electric Project School held in Camp Point. We are happy that 7 4-H'ers from Brown County are attending the school. The meetings are under the direction of Ron Dedert, Assistant Farm Advisor of Adams County. First year instructors are Everett Shoopman and Bill Klusmeyer of CIPS Co., and Roger Mohrman and G.A. Moody of Adams Electrical Co-op are working with the Second Year and Advanced Groups.

First year enrollees are working on extension cords, test lamps, and learning some fundamentals of electricity. Second year 4-H'ers are wiring single pole switches, building test panels and studying motors. The Advanced group is learning about electric heating, controls, advanced wiring and toured the motor repair plant at Richards Electric Motor Company in Quincy. Electrical safety is stressed throughout the school.

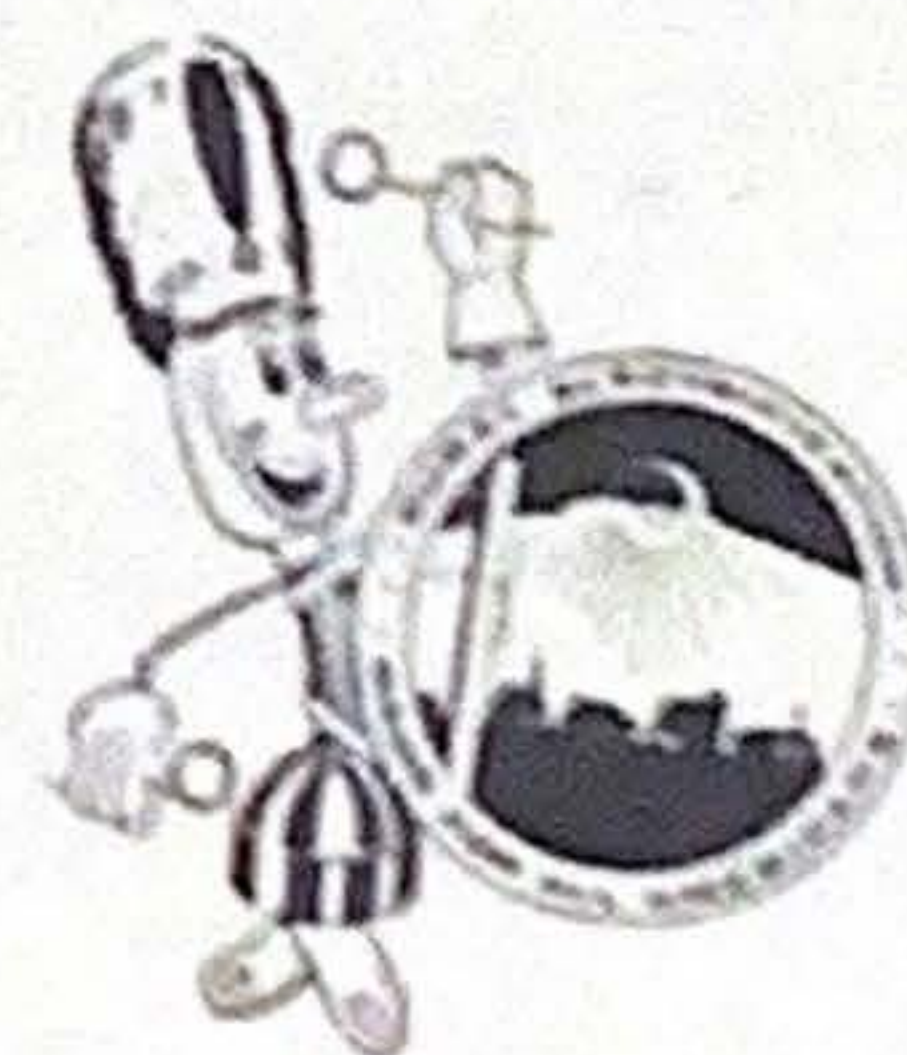


Mouse-eye view...of...
