WHAT TO DO WHEN THE POWER IS OFF

1. Check your fuses and switches below meter. If some of your lights work, then the trouble is in your own fuses. Remember to check the main cartridge fuses in the fuse box.
2. If all the lights are off, then check with your neighbor to see if his power is off.
3. If you have not found the trouble, call the appropriate number listed below. Be sure to give your name, location and map number which is to the right of your name on the address side of the billing card. This map number is used the same as a street address in locating your place. Please call in as soon as the trouble is discovered or anything wrong with the line is noticed.

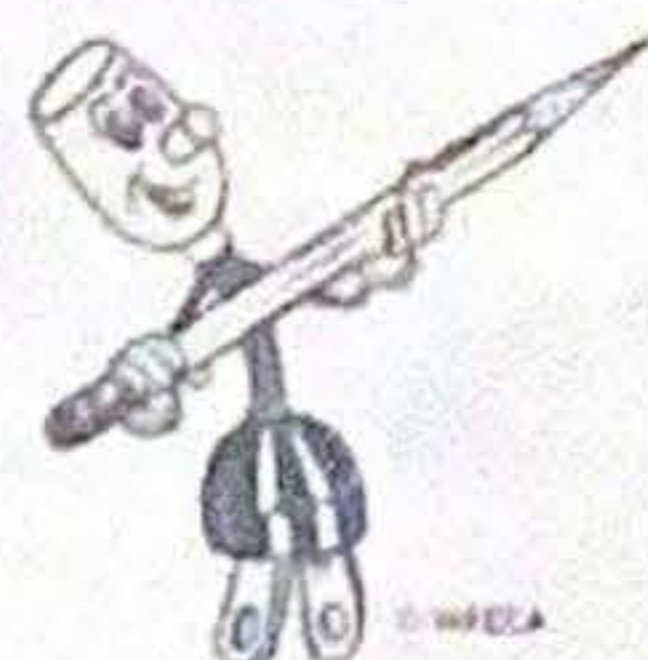

BROWN COUNTY 4-H ELECTRIC SCHOOL

The Brown County 4-H Electric Project school started on April 3rd and continued on consecutive Tuesday nights through May 1st. The May 1st meeting was family night and those taking the project entertained with 4-H electric demonstrations. Refreshments were served at each meeting. This year 31 boys enrolled in the project and the school was under the direction of Robert Hayward, Brown County Farm Adviser, with Roger Mohrman and G. A. Moody of Adams Electrical Co-operative and Roger Baker of CIPS Co. furnishing the instruction.

First year enrollees worked on extension cords and test lamps and learned fundamentals of electricity. Second year 4-H'ers wired single pole and three-way switches, built test panels and studied motors. Electrical safety was stressed throughout the school. Three boys working on the advanced project helped with the instruction and will develop home projects.

BAKING AND DECORATING WINS PRIZES, FRIENDS

Mrs. Gerhard (Velma) Taute of Golden has an unusual talent for baking and decorating cakes. She comes by this talent naturally because her mother was well-known in baking circles, and enjoyed a successful, small, custom baking business. Mrs. Taute began custom baking in 1948 when a lady asked her mother to bake a cake and she was unable to do it, so Velma baked and decorated the cake. This venture led her into an enjoyable pastime and hobby of baking and she displayed her bakery goods at the Golden Fall Festival that year.

Velma is reluctant to reveal her honors from exhibiting her bakery items at fairs and shows, but we were able to pry from her that she has won practically every baking award at the Adams County Fair; Hancock County Fair and the Golden Corn Festival. In 1959 her rolls won the Fleischman's award at the Adams County Fair for best of show using a yeast product. Velma's most smashing success was

at the Illinois State Fair in 1960 when she displayed nine products and won seven premiums. Among these nine products was a wedding cake which won 1st in state in decorating — professional class.

Mrs. Taute is unable to guess how many cakes she has baked. She uses her own white cake recipe which she heard one time over the radio and has not had a failure using this recipe. She has never revealed her recipe to anyone, but may someday if her daughter, Linda Ann in the 8th grade at Golden Grade School, decides to follow her mother's and grandmother's footsteps in baking and decorating.

Mrs. Taute makes practically all her own decorations including butterflies, lattice hearts, roses, bells and lots of flowers. Her tools of trade include two electric mixers and a double oven electric range.

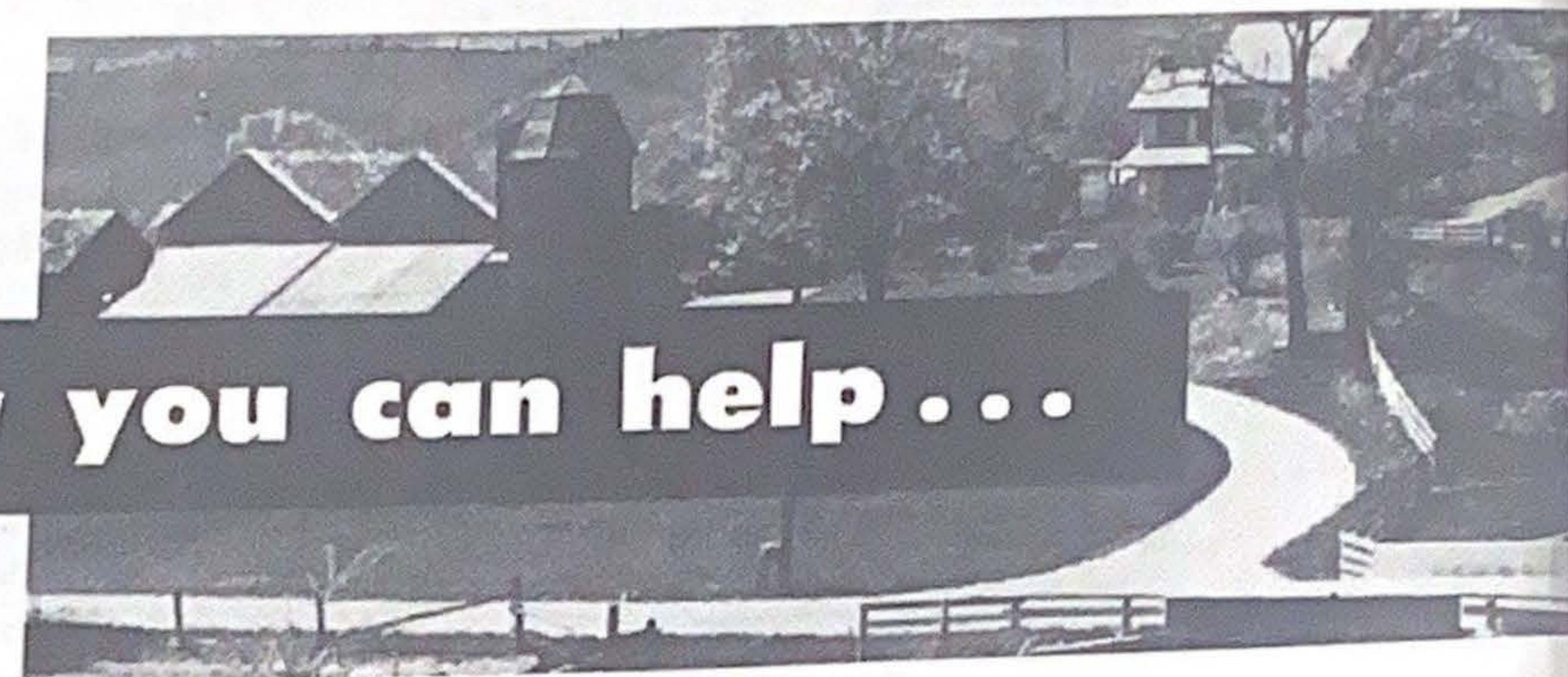

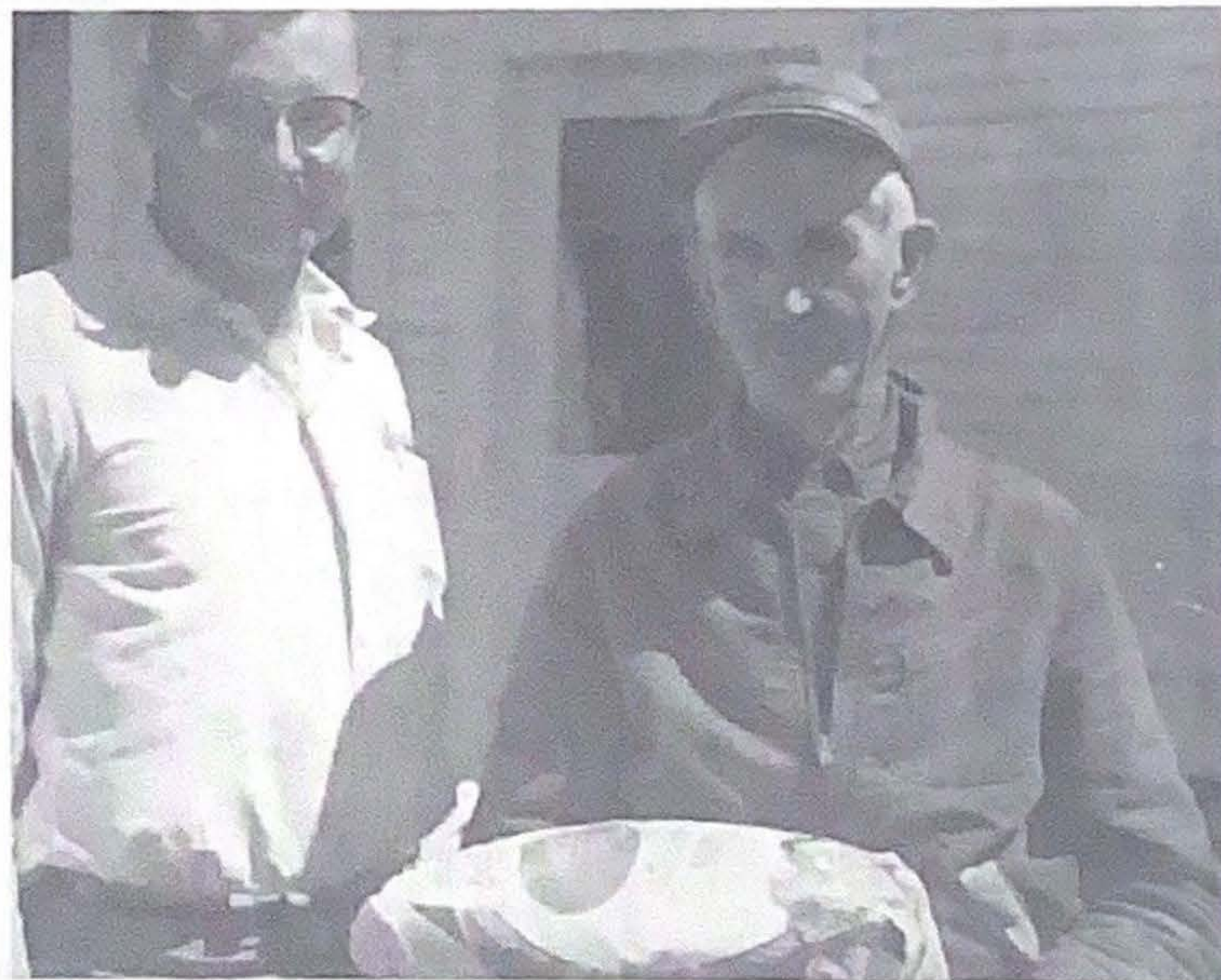

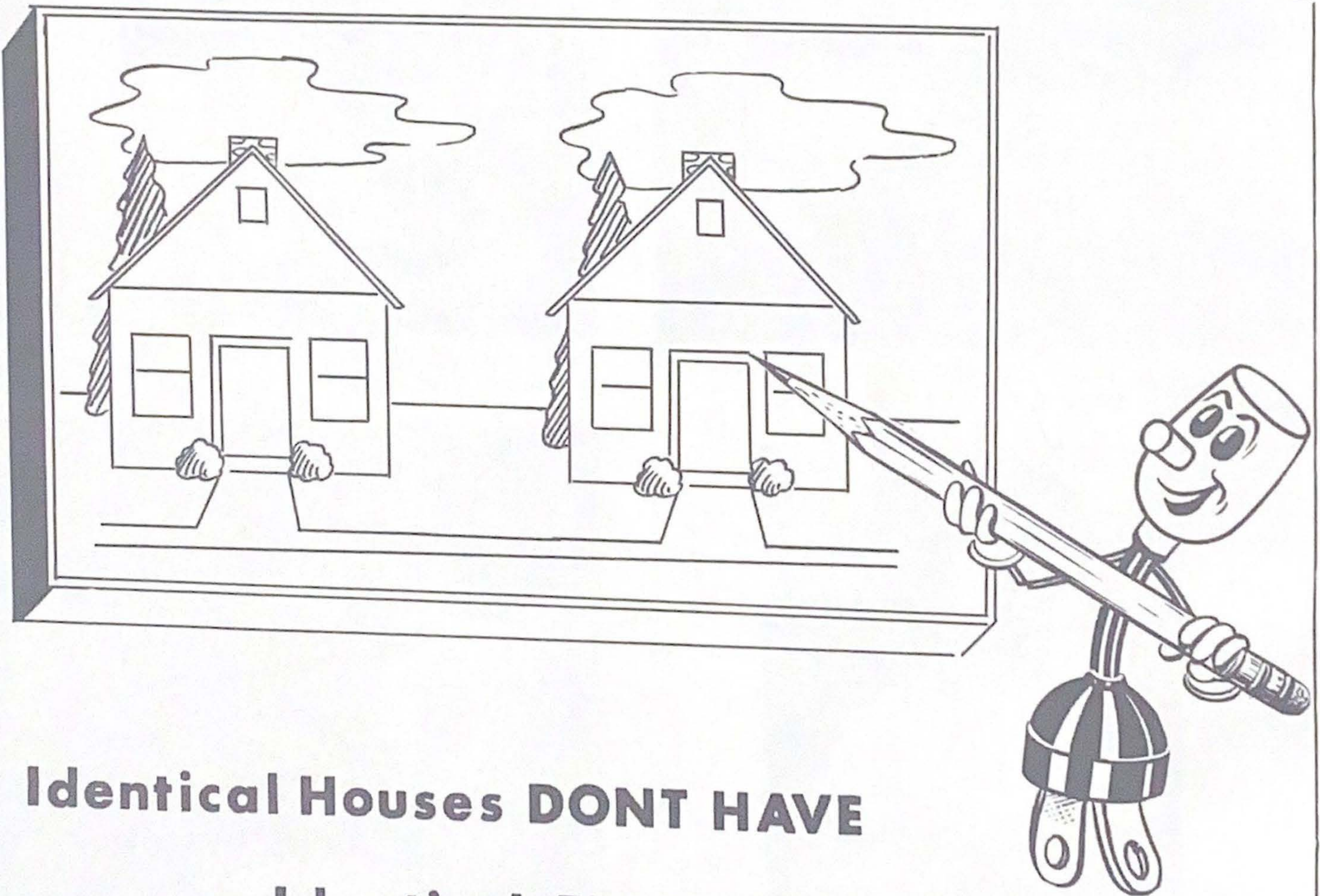
