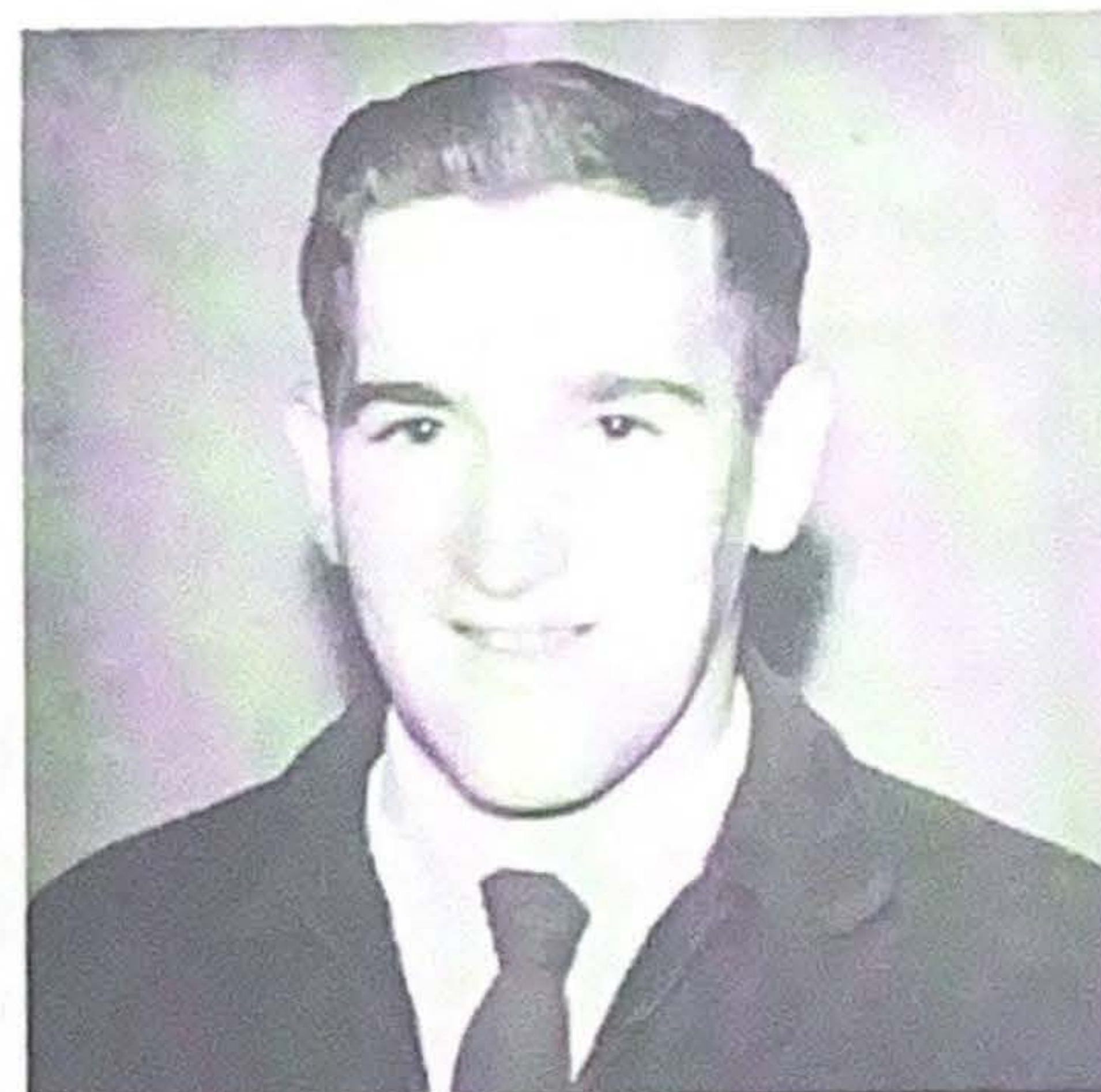

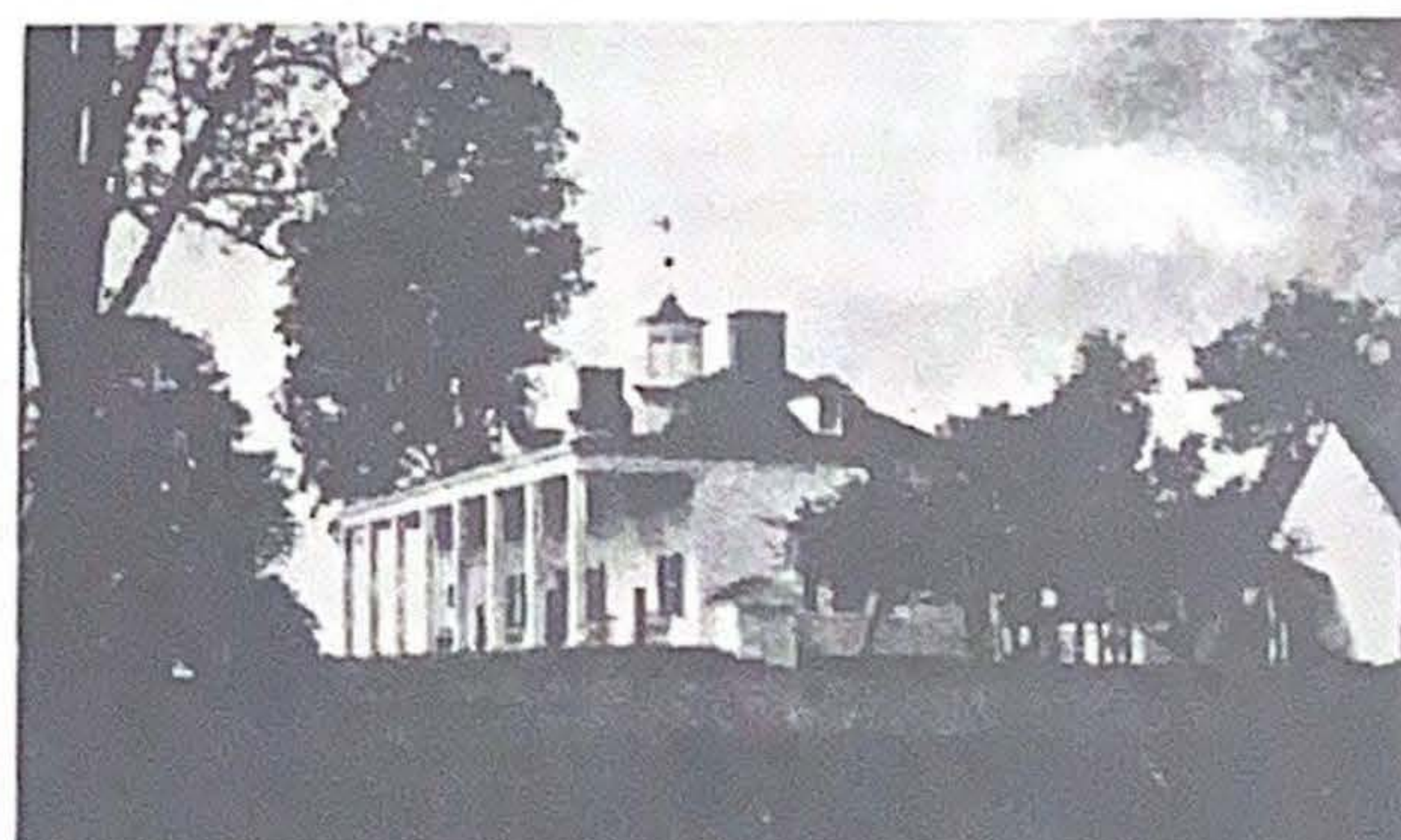
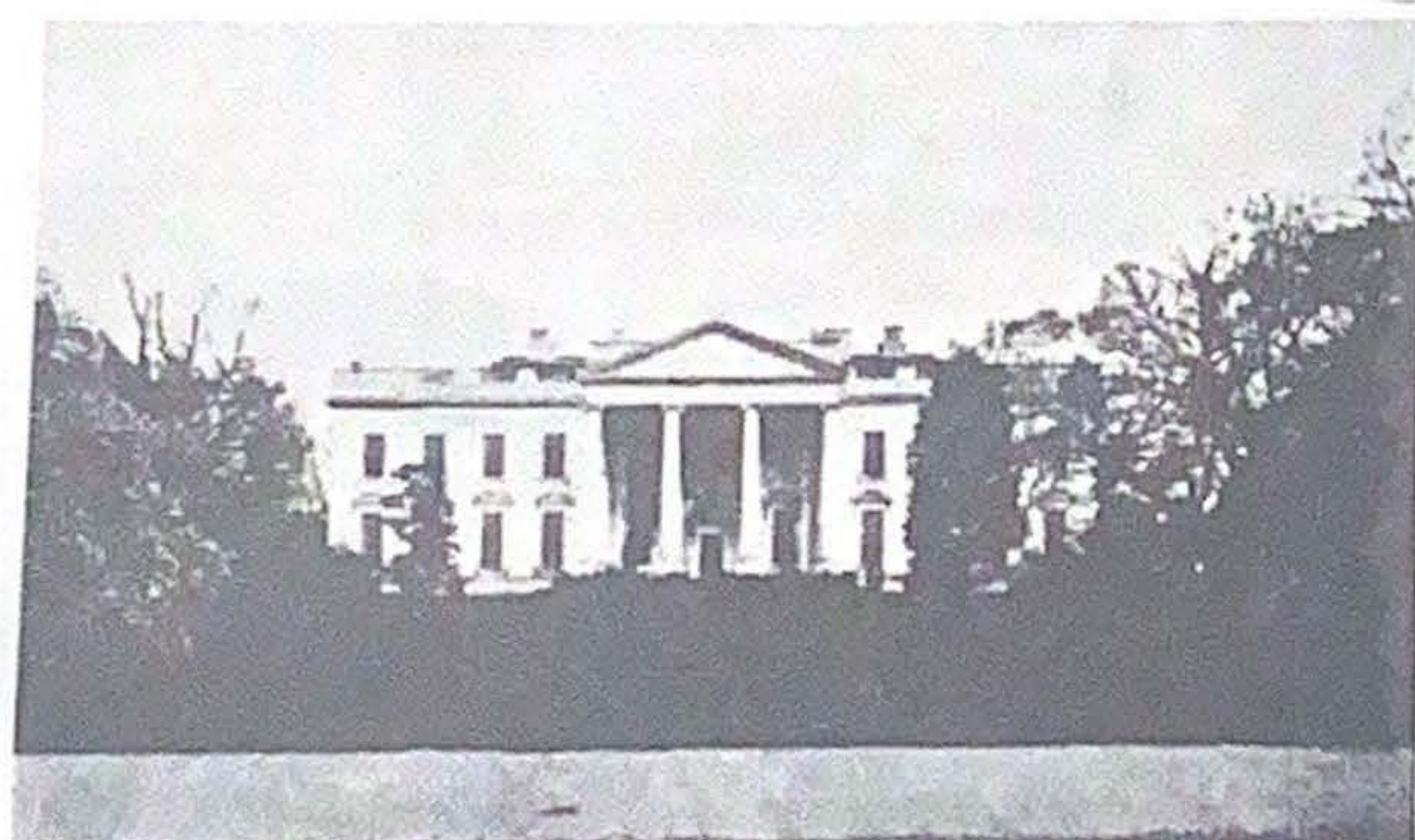

WHAT TO DO WHEN THE POWER IS OFF

1. Check your fuses and switches below meter. If some of your lights work, then the trouble is in your own fuses. Remember to check the main cartridge fuses in the fuse box.
2. If all the lights are off, then check with your neighbor to see if his power is off.
3. If you have not found the trouble, call the appropriate number listed below. Be sure to give your name, location and map number which is to the right of your name on the address side of the billing card. This map number is used the same as a street address in locating your place. Please call in as soon as the trouble is discovered or anything wrong with the line is noticed.

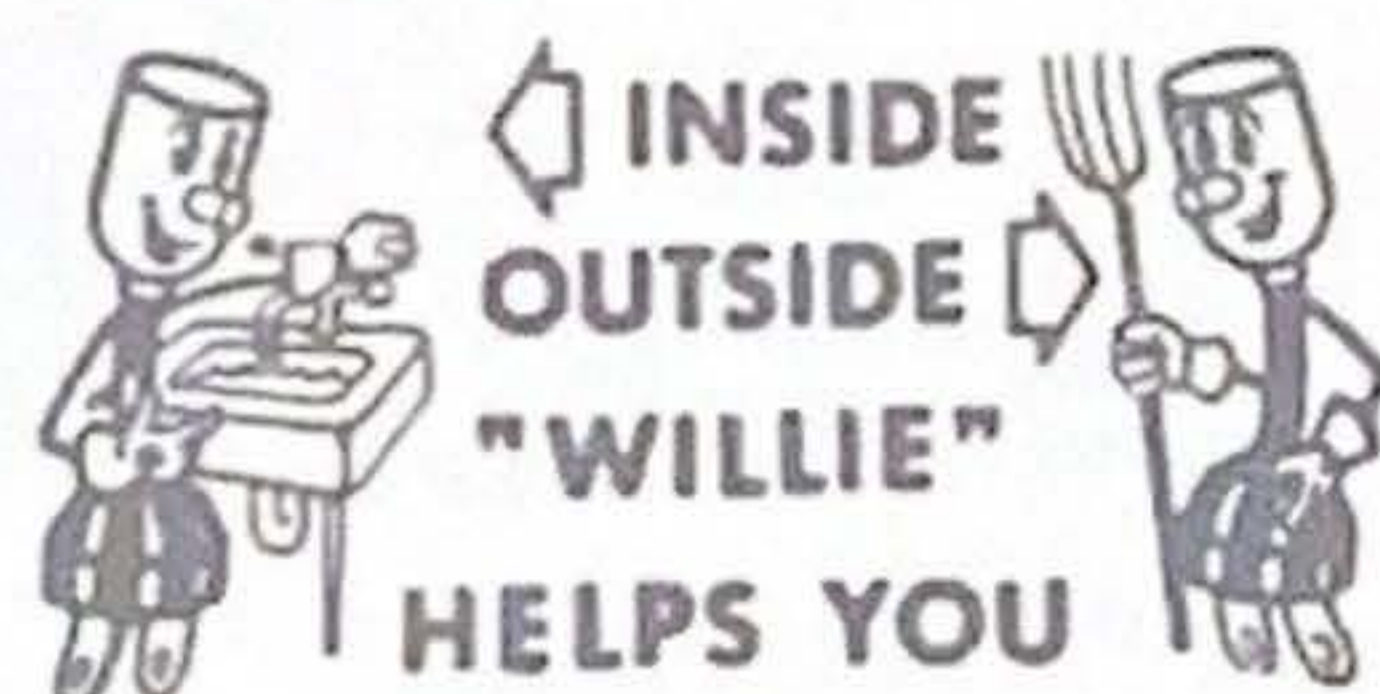

In addition to these many activities she will find time to call on any of our members who have need of her advice on kitchen and laundry plan-

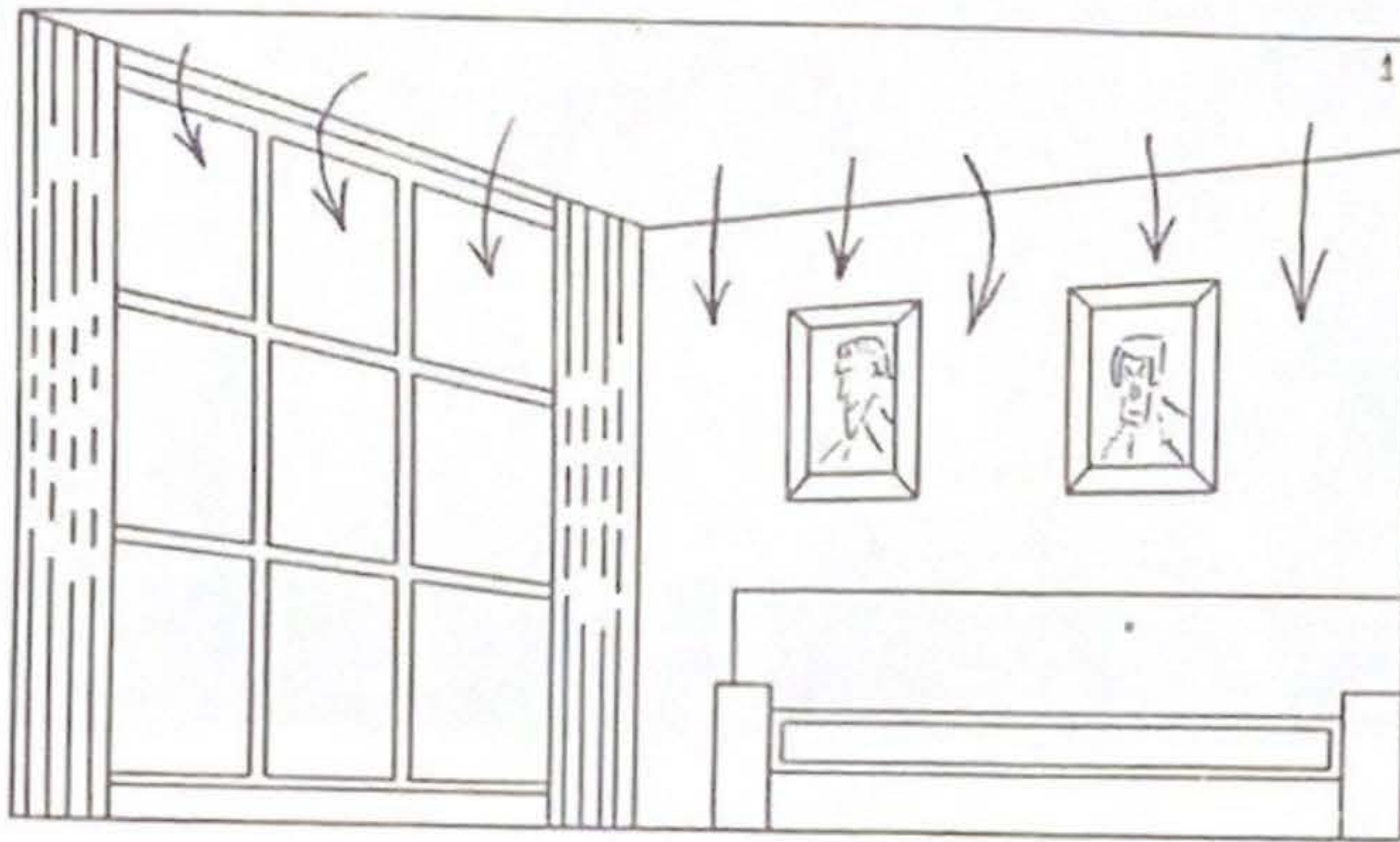
ning, lighting and choosing of appliances. We hope you will call on Pat for her services and we are certain you will find her most capable and enjoyable to work with.



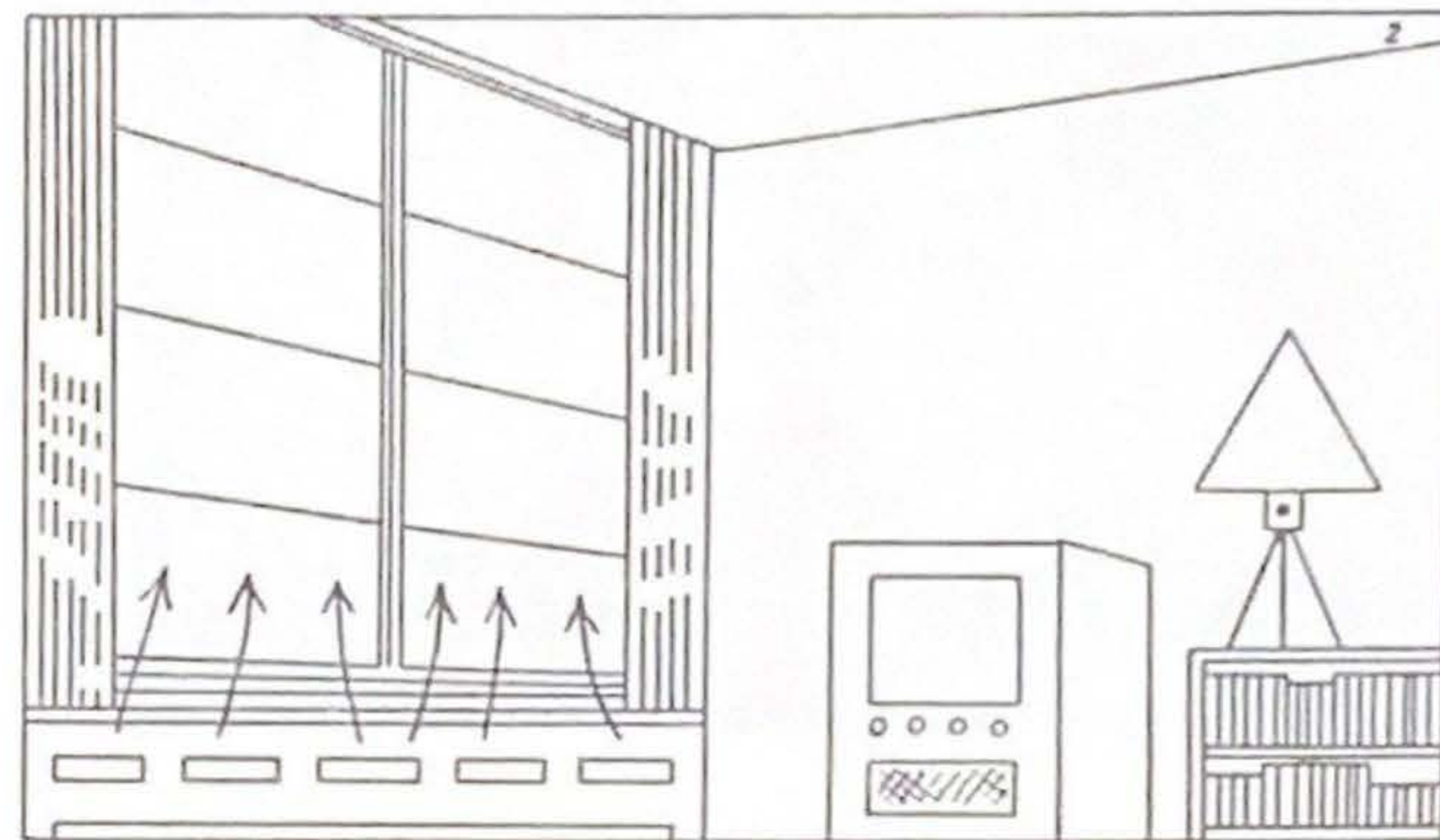

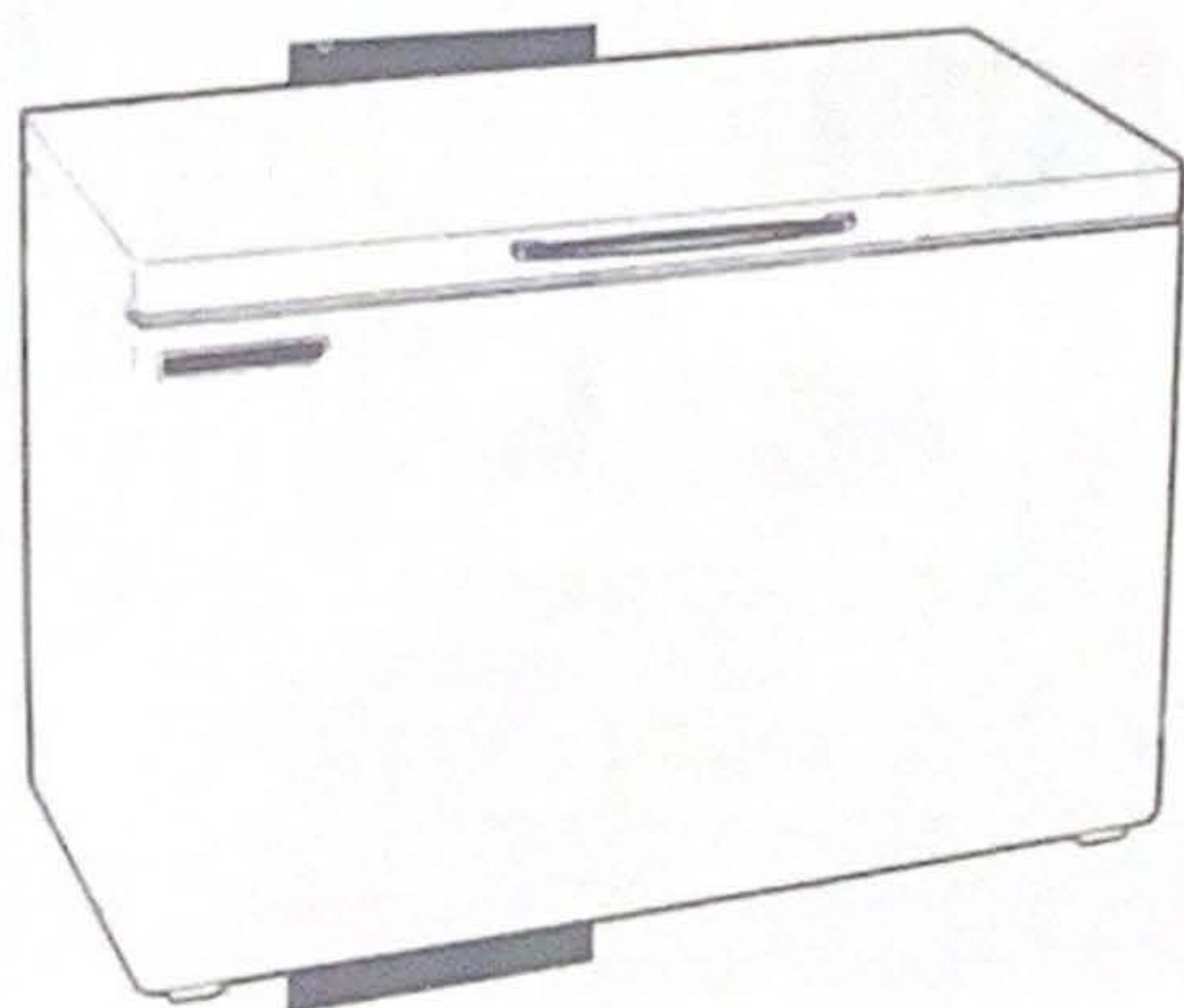

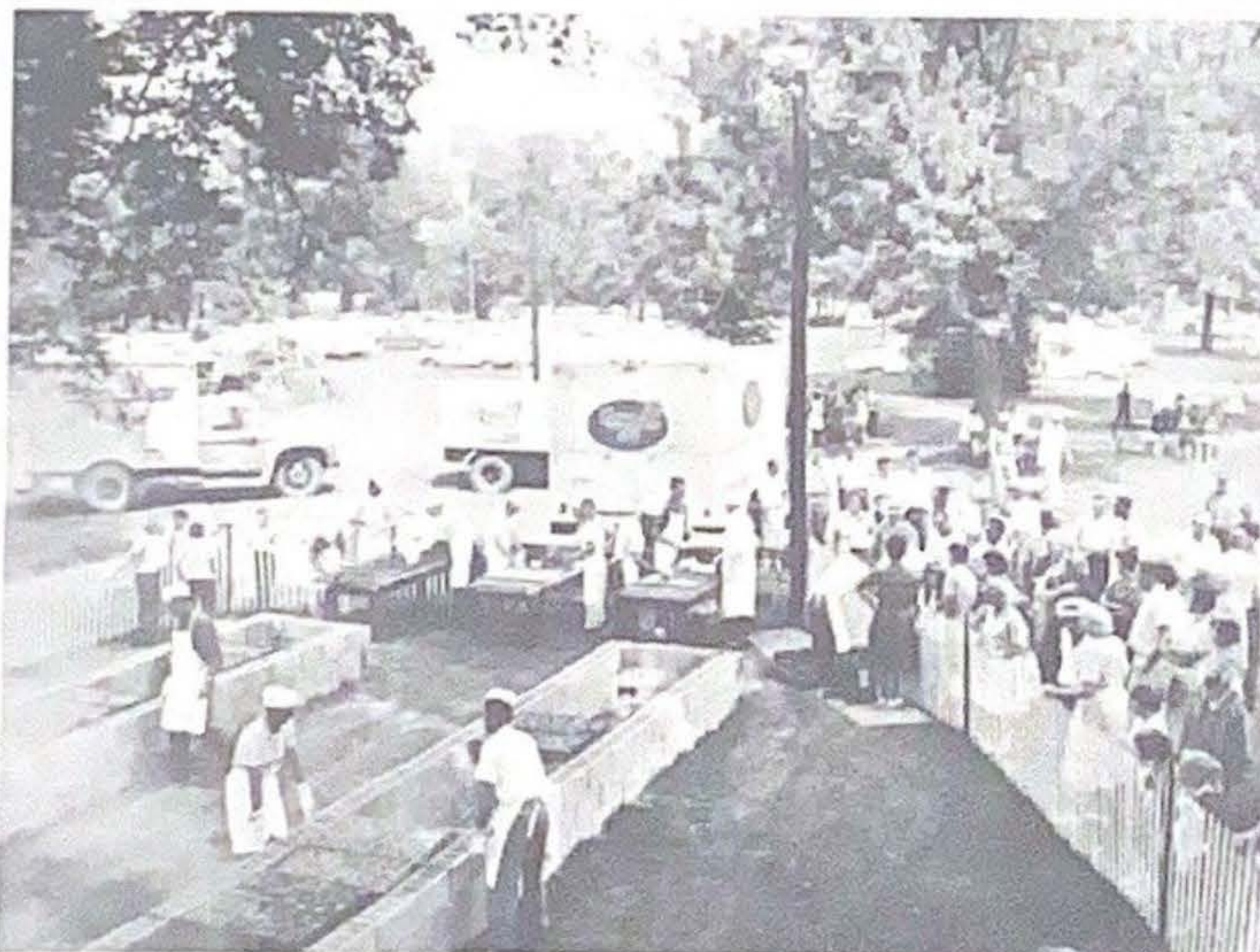
BEAUTY CONTEST

ENJOY YOUR GARDEN ALL YEAR 'ROUND

Now is the time to begin harvesting berries, vegetables, etc., from your home garden. What better place is there to store these fine foods than in your own home freezer? By having a home freezer for keeping food you do away with the tiresome task of canning. For example, green vegetables like peas and beans are scalded for a minute or two, cooled, packaged and then placed in the freezer and they retain the nutritive values of fresh food. Livestock may be butchered any month of the year and frozen, and poultry may be dressed and stored in any quantity for future meals.

Typical of the modern housewives who have learned to keep foods with-

out canning is Mrs. George Armstrong of Rushville. Mrs. Armstrong purchased her freezer in March of 1961 and sees no reason to can when you have a freezer. One of the few exceptions to this, she says, are pickles. Mrs. Armstrong freezes fruits, berries and vegetables which are, for the most part, raised on their farm. She likes strawberries frozen without sugar better than sweetened before freezing. Mrs. Armstrong offers this tip on freezing chickens—cut up chickens and place in ½-gallon milk cartons. Fill with water and freeze. The water seals out all air and the chickens will keep as good as fresh dressed.
