Petitions must be returned to the Cooperative office **by 4 p.m., June 6, 2024**.

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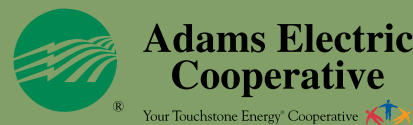

Cooperative Receives Grants

Adams Electric Cooperative was fortunate to receive two grants:

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) grant for Public Light-Duty Electric Vehicle Fast Charging Infrastructure will allow us to install level 3 fast DC charging at two of our commercial members’ locations: John Wood Community College (JWCC) and Holiday Inn. The two members are excited about hosting the charging locations for the benefit of their patrons as well as other electric vehicle owners. The chargers will be owned and operated by the Cooperative with their own electric services. The grant will cover 80% of the installation.

Second, if awarded, the U.S. Department of Energy’s Office of Clean Energy Demonstrations Grant will allow us to install low cost electric generation for our members. The plan is to install a 1 MW wind

turbine and 1 MW solar facility to produce our own energy to be used by our members. These generation facilities will be interconnected with the existing Sugar Grove Substation in Schuyler County. The Cooperative already operates wind turbines in Adams and Brown County. This grant will allow for the installation of renewable generation in Schuyler County. Adams, Brown, and Schuyler are the three main counties we serve. All members, no matter what county they live in, will receive the benefits of the low cost generation.

The two diversified generation resources complement each other and provide for a more level annual power generation curve. Wind generation is better in the wintertime and the solar is better in the summertime. The combined facility will produce 3.6 million kWhs and serve the energy needs of approximately 300 homes.

Adams Electric has begun award negotiations with the OCED for up to \$5 million in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding as part of the Energy Improvements in Rural

or Remote Areas (ERA) program. This amount will cover the majority of the cost. The Cooperative will take advantage of direct pay tax incentives as well.

Our plan is to actively work with area schools and community organizations to provide educational opportunities and tours about solar and wind renewable generation. The projects will also create local construction jobs.

The Adams Electric Cooperative Green Energy Project was selected as one of 19 community-led clean energy projects across 12 states and 13 tribal nations and communities to receive more than \$78 million to develop and deploy sustainable clean energy solutions and expand access to reliable and affordable energy in rural and remote communities across the country.



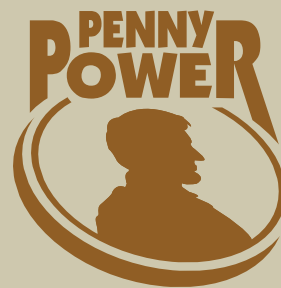

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10 Tips & Tricks to Becoming Energy Efficient

Energy efficiency simply means using less energy to perform the same tasks or eliminating energy waste. Being energy efficient saves money and the environment by lowering demand for energy and, by extension, greenhouse gas emissions.

If you're a homeowner trying to manage your electric usage on a budget, energy efficiency may seem more fantasy than reality. Energy efficiency is often seen as an expensive and unobtainable goal for many homeowners, but it doesn't have to be. Trimming your electric usage is as quick and simple as making a few modest behavior changes and a little investment in cost-efficient technology.

Here are some of the most common ways Adams Electric members can ditch high energy bills and become more efficient in their daily energy usage.

1 Make the Switch to LEDs

There's been a strong push for the switch to LEDs for years, and for good reason. LEDs last up to 25x longer and consume 90 percent less energy.

2 Seal Those Leaks

Have you ever left a window cracked in the winter and realized how quickly the cold air can cool your home? Little leaks can be equivalent to leaving a 3ft x 3ft window open.

3 Install a Smart Thermostat

While an initially high investment, a smart thermostat will pay for itself over time by learning your routine and adjusting accordingly. You can even control it remotely. Members can also enroll in United Power's Rush Hour Rewards program to save even more. More info at www.unitedpower.com/rush-hour-rewards.

4 Heat & Cool Efficiently

Heating and cooling accounts for almost half your energy use. Raising or lowering the temp on your thermostat a few degrees won't always compromise comfort.

5 Use a Ceiling Fan

Using a ceiling fan in combination with proper cooling will allow you to raise your thermostat by as much as 4 degrees without losing any comfort. However, don't run a ceiling fan in an empty room.

6 Maintain Your HVAC System

A dirty furnace has to work harder to move air. Don't forget to change air filters during both heating and cooling seasons to keep energy costs low.

7 Look for the Label

The ENERGY STAR® label means this appliance is certified energy efficient. United Power also offers rebates on ENERGY STAR® refrigerators, dishwashers and washing machines.

8 Turn Off Electronics

Electronics on "standby" contribute to "vampire loads," which is when a device draws energy even when it appears to be off. Turn off all idle electronics that aren't in use.

9 The Sun is Key

In the winter, open curtains during the day to allow sunlight to naturally heat your home. In the summer, excess sunlight will make your A/C work harder, so keep those curtains closed.

10 Don't Peak in the Oven

Opening the oven door while cooking or baking can cause the internal temperature to drop by as much as 25 degrees making it work harder to return to the right temperature and also affecting cooking times of your dinner or dessert.

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USE METALLIC BALLOONS SAFELY!

The following tips will help you use metallic balloons safely:

Creamy Chicken Rotini

Creamy Chicken Rotini

1 lb. rotini pasta
2 cups chopped or shredded chicken
1 packet ranch seasoning mix
8 oz. cream cheese, softened
1 cup sharp cheddar cheese, shredded
1/2 cup chicken broth
1/2 cup heavy cream
1 Tbsp. olive oil
1/2 onion, diced
2 cloves garlic, minced
Salt and pepper to taste
2 Tbsp. chopped fresh parsley for garnish

Cook pasta according to package instructions, drain, and set aside. In a large skillet, heat olive oil over medium heat. Add diced onion and minced garlic, saute until translucent. Reduce heat to low, add cream cheese and ranch seasoning, stirring until smooth and creamy. Gradually pour in broth and heavy cream, stirring until sauce is well combined. Add chicken and cheddar cheese to the skillet, stirring until cheese is melted. Combine the rotini with the chicken mixture and mix thoroughly. Garnish with fresh parsley before serving.

Easy Overnight Caramel Rolls

1 cup chopped pecans
Pkg. frozen dinner rolls (24)
1/2 cup sugar
1 Tbsp. cinnamon
1 stick butter
1 sm. box Cook & Serve butterscotch pudding
1/2 cup brown sugar

Butter a 9x13 pan. Dump pecans in pan and spread out evenly. Layer dinner rolls on top. Mix sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle over rolls. Heat butter, pudding mix, and brown sugar, bringing to a boil. Pour evenly over frozen rolls. Cover with foil. Place in cold oven. Let rise overnight. In the morning, do not open oven. Set oven at 350 degrees and bake 15 minutes. Uncover rolls and bake 15 more minutes. Turn out on foil and serve. Makes 24 rolls.

Honey Horseradish Roasted Vegetables

2 cups Brussels sprouts, trimmed and halved
2 cups cauliflower, chopped
1 cup radishes, halved
2 garlic cloves, minced
3 Tbsp. extra virgin olive oil
1 1/2 tsp. kosher salt
1 cup honey
1/2 cup prepared horseradish
1/4 cup cilantro
Walnuts (optional)

Preheat oven to 415 degrees. In a large bowl, toss vegetables, olive oil, and salt. Spread in an even layer on 1-2 foil-lined baking sheets. Make sure the Brussels sprouts are flat side down. Roast for 30 minutes or until vegetables are golden brown and tender, tossing occasionally. Meanwhile, heat honey and horseradish together in a saucepan over medium heat until heated through. Pour as much as you like over the vegetables. Toss and serve warm, garnished with cilantro and walnuts.
