It’s been two years since the Cooperative has used a power cost adjustment. Approximately 65% of the costs on members’ electric bills are from purchasing generation and

transmission services. Based on the 2025 budget, the high voltage transmission costs are expected to increase nearly \$500,000, and the power generation purchases are expected to increase around \$1,500,000. Starting in April, the PCA will be used to help with the increase and fluctuations in these costs. Think of it like fueling your car. The price of gas changes every time you fill up. We try to forecast that in the budget and absorb any fluctuation. The PCA is used as a risk management tool to make sure your Cooperative stays financially healthy and meets its financial ratios of its lenders. In addition, the Cooperative is still experiencing upward financial pressure from inflation and interest expense. The PCA helps as a shock absorber for fluctuating prices. Our goal is to make it through the high usage winter months for our members and reevaluate after the first quarter of 2025, hopefully keeping the PCA under a penny.

On another note and illustrating some of the volatility of the wholesale energy market, here is some interesting data from the cold weather in January. The Midcontinent Independent System Operator (MISO) is the electric grid operator for the central United States, covering parts of 15 states in the Midwest region down to the Gulf of Mexico and even extending into Canada. MISO is the regional transmission operator and dispatcher of generation resources, which facilitates the buying and selling of electricity in its region and covers Illinois in our service area. To the right are some snapshots from the cold morning on January 21, 2025.



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PCA Expectations & Market Volatility

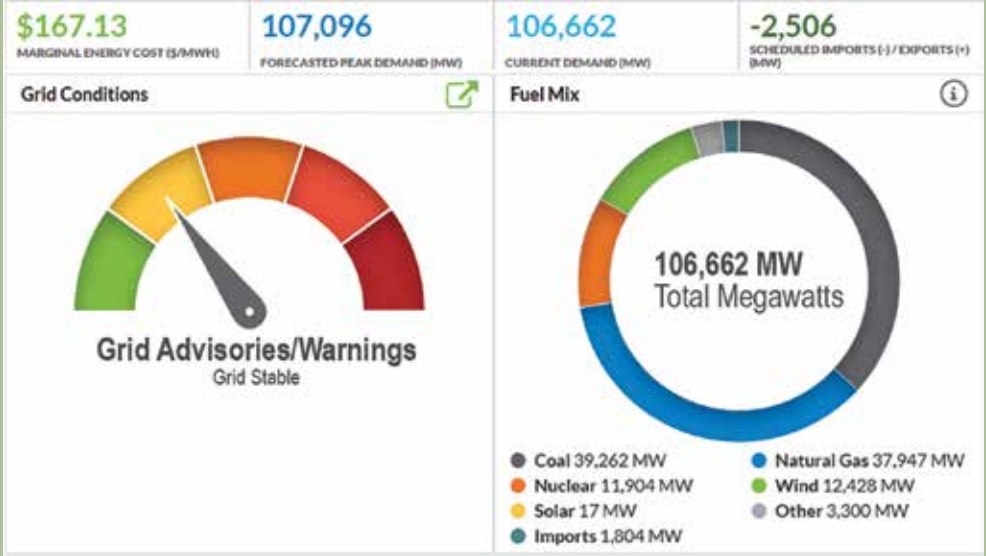
The picture, at right, shows the cost of wholesale power in the real time market at the Illinois hub of \$0.653 per kWh. This amount is significantly higher than utilities’ retail rates.

The picture, below, shows the generation mix that morning and what was keeping the lights on in MISO. This picture shows the importance of having an all of the above generation portfolio. At 7:00-8:00 a.m. in the morning, solar is barely contributing since the sun is just coming up.

The physics of the electrical grid require enough generation to match the load at any given second. Electricity is not like other commodities and is difficult to store economically and in great quantities to be used when needed. This challenge makes prices volatile when demand pushes available supply.



The illustration below shows the generation mix on January 21. This underscores the need for a diverse energy portfolio as solar contributed minimally in the early morning.

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What is Expected of a Director?

Director candidates often ask this question when they consider running for the Board. The following is a list of the minimum requirements for an Adams Electric Cooperative Director:

1. Directors must attend all regular monthly board meetings, usually beginning at 7 p.m. and adjourning three to five hours later.
 2. Directors must attend all special board meetings, committee meetings, and Adams Electric Cooperative's annual meeting.
 3. Other meetings directors attend include educational seminars. Directors are encouraged to complete their NRECA Credentialed Cooperative Director Certificate during their first term (3 years). Incumbent Directors must complete at least two additional continuing educational offerings during a three-year period ending with the second-year of each successive term to maintain eligibility as a director.
 4. Credentialed Directors receive a \$250.00 per diem and mileage (IRS approved mileage rate) for attendance of Cooperative meetings. Non-Credentialed Directors receive a \$200.00 per diem and mileage (IRS approved mileage rate) for attendance of Cooperative meetings. All directors receive transportation, lodging, and meal expenses when traveling on Cooperative business.
 5. Directors spend 23-35 days each year representing Adams Electric Cooperative.
 6. A director is expected to read and be familiar with information and financial reports from the Cooperative, and/or other state and national associations.
 7. A director represents all members of Adams Electric Cooperative, not a geographic region or director district.
 8. A director should work in harmony with the whole board. A director must also have the self-confidence and communication skills to express his/her opinion or disagreement with other directors.
 9. Directors and spouses are encouraged to join NRECA's political action committee, America's Electric Cooperative PAC. Regular membership is \$25.00 per year and Century Club membership is \$100.00 per year.
- Additional details are provided in Adams Electric Cooperative's Bylaws.

Director Nominations by Petition

According to Cooperative Bylaws, members may make nominations by petition with 25 signatures or more at least 90 days prior to the Annual Meeting. This year the Annual Meeting will be Wednesday, **September 4, 2025**. Requests for petitions will begin **March 11, 2025** and can be provided by contacting the Cooperative. Petitions must be returned to the Cooperative office by **4 p.m. June 6, 2025**.

A list of nominations will be posted in the lobby of the Cooperative office within 30 days following the petition deadline. The Secretary shall be responsible for mailing to each member at least 30 days before the date of the Annual Meeting, a statement of the number of Board Members to be

elected and the names and addresses of the candidates nominated in each district.

The Secretary shall be responsible for mailing with the Notice of the Annual Meeting, or separately, but at least five days before the date of the Annual Meeting, a statement of the number of members to be elected and the names and addresses of the candidates. The names of the candidates shall be arranged by district.

The Cooperative is divided into nine districts of representation of membership and each district is represented by one director. Directors serve three-year terms. Their terms in office are staggered so that three of the nine directors are elected each year.

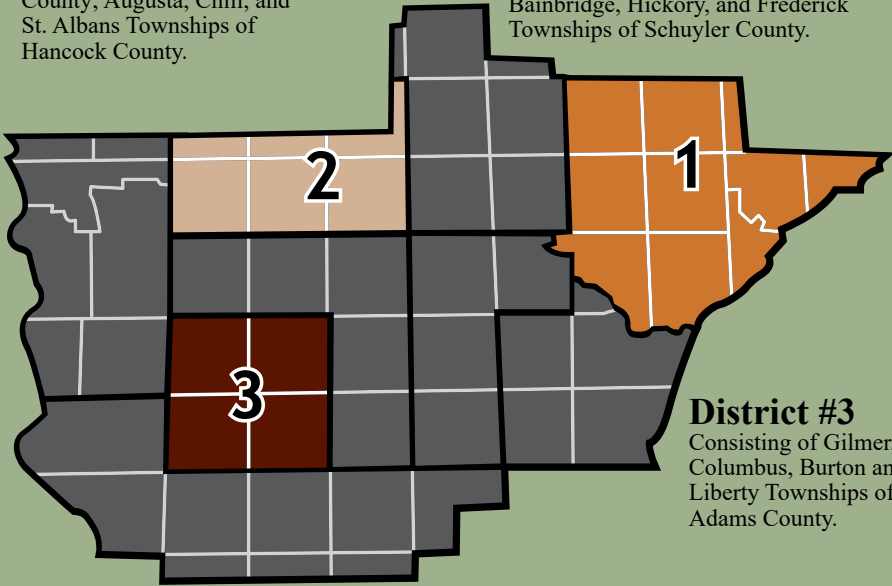
Director districts to be elected in 2025 are as follows:

District #2

Consisting of Keene, Northeast, and Houston Townships of Adams County; Augusta, Chili, and St. Albans Townships of Hancock County.

District #1

Consisting of Astoria Township in Fulton County; Littleton, Oakland, Buena Vista, Woodstock, Browning, Rushville, Bainbridge, Hickory, and Frederick Townships of Schuyler County.



District #3

Consisting of Gilmer, Columbus, Burton and Liberty Townships of Adams County.

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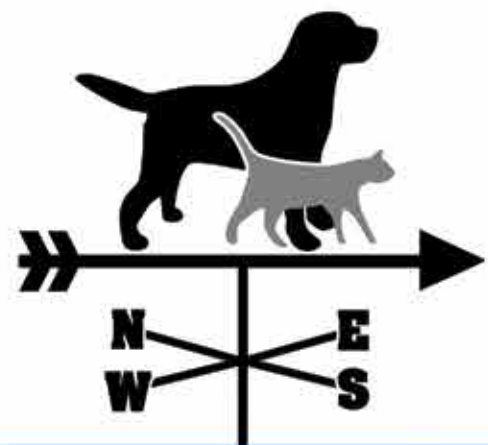

A Haven of Hope

Every year, roughly six million dogs and cats find themselves homeless due to abandonment, neglect, or other unfortunate circumstances. Animal shelters play a crucial role in rescuing, rehabilitating, and rehoming pets in need. Shelters provide these animals with food, medical care, and a second chance at finding a loving home. The benefits of shelters extend beyond just the animals—they also offer companionship and joy to the people who foster or adopt them.

Ronna Robertson has always been an animal lover, but volunteering at an award-winning humane society in Delaware and an animal transport service in one of the poorest areas of North Carolina gave her the passion and experience to start her own animal rescue shelter when she moved to Quincy.

What started out of her garage as strictly a rescue transport service in 2013, Homeward Bound Waggin, Inc. outgrew three locations. In 2017, the shelter landed at its current home at 1800 North 24th Street in Quincy, now focusing primarily on dog adoptions, cat transports, and fostering of both.

Rescue shelters have a few options: transporting, adoptions, and fostering. Transporting animals offers a couple of major benefits. First, animals who have been living in a shelter for an extended period of time are given a fresh audience and new possibilities. For example, last year, Homeward Bound received 10 puppies which are hard to adopt out in large numbers. They traded the puppies with a shelter near St. Louis for Cookie, a dog that had been in their shelter for over 6 months, simply to give her a new opportunity.

Second, some breeds find homes faster in areas where their breed is less dominant. For instance, dogs in this area are typically the farming dogs like German Shepherds, Cattle Dogs, and Beagles. Less common breeds in our area include Dobermans, Rottweilers, and Great Danes, for example. Although Homeward Bound doesn't do as much transporting with dogs, there are still unique situations where this is an option.

Homeward Bound does a lot of cat transports, mostly to a large cat rescue in Chicago that works with 38 Pet Smarts in the Chicago area. Locally, cats are everywhere. In the rural areas, you can almost attract a cat simply by putting out a bowl of food. In a city, like Chicago, cats are less common. Residents in the city might even prefer a cat over a dog. "Cats are more likely allowed by their landlord and no one wants to take a dog down an elevator several times a day," explains Ronna.

The fostering option gives dogs and cats practice living in a home setting. Socialization programs help them build trust with humans, increasing their chances of successful adoption.

The pandemic had a major impact on pet adoptions and animal shelters like Homeward Bound. During the height of the pandemic, shelters faced staffing shortages, fundraising challenges, and logistic difficulties, and even a decrease in veterinary care. Meanwhile, the pandemic initially led to a surge in pet adoptions. With more employees working from home, more people decided to adopt. Shelters were emptying out!

"Backyard breeding surged as 'designer dogs' grew in popularity. Now there's a 'doodle' for everything!" says Ronna. By 2021, countless puppies were being born, with buyers flocking to the trendy hybrids.

However, as life returned to normal and people headed back to work, shelters experienced an increase in pet surrenders, as new owners found it challenging to care for their pets. From mid-2022 through 2023, euthanasia rates reached their highest levels in 35 years. No-kill shelters like Homeward Bound were at full capacity, with their usual transport partners unable to take in more animals.

In 2024, things started to improve. "Finally, we're beginning to see an increase in people adopting," says Ronna.

"At Homeward Bound, about half of the animals come from owner surrenders, while the other half are strays," says Ronna. Most strays tend to be around eight to 10 months old. Currently, the shelter cares for 27 dogs and an average of 35 cats, including those in foster-to-adopt programs.

Animals receive proper medical and behavioral care as part of their stay at the shelter. This puts them in a better position for their health and well-being and also increases their chances for adoption.

Stray animals often suffer from malnutrition, disease, and injury. At Homeward Bound, they receive proper veterinary care, vaccinations, and a chance to recover from any trauma they may have endured. Dr. Jodi Markle, DVM provides physical exams, heartworm tests, vaccines, and antibiotics. Dr. Paul Sculley, DVM handles any necessary surgeries.

Allie Fekete, dog trainer and owner of Nerdy Dog Training offers her services to teach dogs basic behavioral skills. "Most of our dogs just need basic house manners. They come to us young and just haven't had a chance to learn those things," comments Ronna. Allie has incredible talent, working as a pet talent scout. "At age 16, she was training and taking dogs to New York for plays," adds Ronna.

Volunteers are a huge part of what makes Homeward Bound so successful. As the shelter grew so did the need for dedicated helpers. Today, around 40 volunteers contribute in various capacities, from feeding, cleaning kennels, and walking dogs to managing daily care. One oversees finances, some serve as local drivers, and another lends their skills as a graphic designer. Others assist with

building maintenance, painting murals, and even organizing fundraisers -- each playing a vital role in keeping the shelter running smoothly.

Vicki Boylen, longest-serving volunteer, started helping almost from the very beginning (many of you may know her as the wife of the late Pat Boylen, one of Adams Electric's longest-serving employees.) Vicki helps at the shelter on a weekly basis and has fostered 15 dogs. "There's been several I could have kept. I always cry when they leave, but knowing they are going to their forever home and not back to the shelter helps me feel better about them leaving," comments Vicki.

There are many ways to support animal shelters. Adopting a pet from a shelter instead of buying from a breeder helps reduce pet overpopulation. Fostering gives pets a temporary home instead of living in a shelter and it works well for those who can't commit to long-term ownership. Donating funds, food, and supplies can make a significant difference in the quality of care shelters can provide. Volunteering time to walk dogs, clean kennels, socialize cats, or assist with shelter operations also contributes to the well-being of the animals.

Animal shelters are more than just temporary homes for pets in need—they are life-saving organizations that give dogs and cats a second chance. By supporting shelters and adopting animals, we can help ensure that every pet finds a safe and loving home.

Turn off lights and ceiling fans in unoccupied rooms to conserve energy.



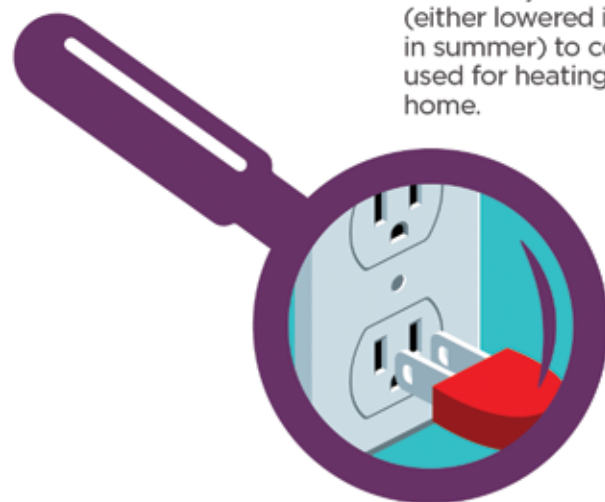
☐ TASK: Sealed for Savings

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 cup onions
- 1 cup diced green pepper
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 Tbsp. paprika
- 2 cups elbow macaroni
- 1 can diced tomatoes, undrained
- 1 (15 oz.) can tomato sauce
- 2 cups beef broth
- 1 cup water
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp. Italian seasoning

Brown ground beef with onions, drain grease. Add green pepper, salt, pepper, paprika, macaroni, tomatoes, tomato sauce, broth, water, Worcestershire sauce, and Italian seasoning. Cook until macaroni is soft. More water may be added according to preferred consistency.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 13x9x2 inch pan. Dump undrained pineapple in the pan. Spread evenly. Dump pie filling on top, spread evenly. Dump dry cake mix onto cherry layer; spread evenly. Sprinkle nuts over cake mix. Dot with oleo on top. Bake at 350 for 45-50 minutes. Serve warm or cooled.

1st Place Cheeseburger Soup

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 12 slices bacon, cooked crispy and chopped
- 1 white onion, chopped
- 1 cup chopped carrots
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 4 cups gold potatoes, peeled and diced
- 1 1/2 tsp. dried basil
- 1 1/2 tsp. dried parsley
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 4 cups chicken broth
- 3 cups Velveeta (about 3/4 of a large block)
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1/4 cup cornstarch

Brown ground beef in a large skillet over high heat. Add in onion. Brown and crumble the beef. Drain any excess grease. Add beef to a 6 quart crockpot. Cook bacon on medium-high heat until crispy and set aside to crumble when cool. Add celery, carrots, and potatoes to crockpot as well as crumbled bacon. Sprinkle with basil, parsley, salt, and pepper. Pour in broth. Cover and cook on low for 6 to 8 hours or high for 4 to 5 hours, or until the potatoes can be cut through with a fork. With one hour remaining, combine the heavy cream and cornstarch together to create a slurry and stir it into the slow cooker. Stir in the Velveeta cheese. Cover and cook for 1 hour. Optional: Serve with green onions, sour cream, pickles, and crumbled bacon.
