This achievement reflects a strong safety culture built on training, accountability, and respect for the work our employees perform every day. Linework is inherently demanding and often dangerous, but through careful planning, proper tools, and proven work practices, safety remains our top priority.

A Culture Where Safety Comes First

Safety at the Cooperative is not a program—it is a mindset. Every task begins with job briefings, hazard identification, and clear communication. Our crews are empowered to stop work if conditions are unsafe, and leadership fully supports those decisions. This culture ensures that safety is never compromised for speed or convenience.

Investing in training, personal protective equipment, and modern tools allows our employees to perform their jobs confidently and correctly. These investments protect lives, reduce injuries, and strengthen our ability to serve our members reliably.

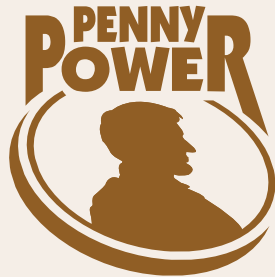


Daylight Saving Time Begins

PENNY POWER Grants Awarded

Twelve Penny Power grant applications were approved in January 2026 totaling \$8,570. The following organizations were awarded Penny Power grants:

- **\$1,275** - City of Mt. Sterling; bullet-proof vests for police officers
- **\$570** - QU Brenner Library; water bottle filling station
- **\$375** - Liberty Trap Team; trap shooting program
- **\$550** - St. Dominic School; supplies for visual arts program
- **\$925** - Bella Ease; replenish hygiene closet
- **\$300** - Golden Public Library; gaming system for patrons
- **\$400** - IL vs MO Senior Track Meet; Special Olympics
- **\$800** - Versailles Township; commercial-grade refrigerator for community building
- **\$900** - Payson-Seymour High School National Honor Society; project to clean, reset, and restore tombstones in Payson's oldest cemetery
- **\$875** - Liberty Schools; materials for construction class's project to build a retaining wall on school property
- **\$850** - Schuyler-Industry Pre-K; age-appropriate materials for STEAM program
- **\$750** - Blessed Sacrament Catholic School; STREAM program

Penny Power grants to date now total **\$732,743.36!** The next deadline to apply for a Penny Power grant is April 6, 2026.

Adams Electric recognized for outstanding workplace practices

Safety leadership and training were the focus of the 2026 Safety and Energy Conference, held Jan. 28-29 in Springfield. The two-day event brought together electric cooperative professionals, safety leaders, and industry partners for educational sessions, networking and recognition of outstanding safety performance.

The conference, which was held by the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives, covered a range of topics focused on leadership, safety and workplace culture, including personal influence and leadership, technical safety training, and the role of safety culture in the workplace. (6880-002)

Safety awards were also given, recognizing cooperatives for exemplary safety performance over the past year. Adams Electric Cooperative earned the 2025 Best Loss Time Rate, the 2025 Best Incident Rate, and the 2025 RESAP Certificates of Achievement.

The Best Loss Time Rate Award is given to cooperatives with the lowest amount of lost work time due to workplace injuries, relative to the number of hours worked. The Best Incident Rate Award recognizes

the cooperatives with the lowest overall number of recordable workplace incidents, including minor injuries.

The 2025 RESAP Certificate of Achievement indicates that the co-op completed the Rural Electric Safety Achievement Program, a program that was developed to maintain a culture of safety at cooperatives. By participating in the program, cooperatives commit to safety as an organizational value through training, educating, and assessing its workforce.

As the electric industry continues to evolve, safety remains a top priority. Adams Electric Cooperative will always be committed to a strong safety culture for both employees and cooperative members.

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Director Nominations by Petition

What is Expected of a Director?

Director candidates often ask this question when they consider running for the Board. The following is a list of the minimum requirements for an Adams Electric Cooperative Director:

1. Directors must attend all regular monthly board meetings, usually beginning at 7 p.m. and adjourning three to five hours later.
2. Directors must attend all special board meetings, committee meetings, and Adams Electric Cooperative's annual meeting.
3. Other meetings directors attend include educational seminars. Directors are encouraged to complete their NRECA Credentialed Cooperative Director Certificate during their first term (3 years). Incumbent Directors must complete at least two additional continuing educational offerings during a three-year period ending with the second-year of each successive term to maintain eligibility as a director.
4. Credentialed Directors receive a \$250.00 per diem and mileage (IRS approved mileage rate) for attendance of Cooperative meetings. Non-Credentialed Directors receive a \$200.00 per diem and mileage (IRS approved mileage rate) for attendance of Cooperative meetings. All directors receive transportation, lodging, and meal expenses when traveling on Cooperative business.
5. Directors spend 23-35 days each year representing Adams Electric Cooperative.
6. A director is expected to read and be familiar with information and financial reports from the Cooperative, and/or other state and national associations.
7. A director represents all members of Adams Electric Cooperative, not a geographic region or director district.
8. A director should work in harmony with the whole board. A director must also have the self-confidence and communication skills to express his/her opinion or disagreement with other directors.
9. Directors and spouses are encouraged to join NRECA's political action committee, Action Committee for Rural Electrification (PAC).

Additional details are provided in Adams Electric Cooperative's Bylaws.

According to Cooperative Bylaws, members may make nominations by petition with 25 signatures or more at least 90 days prior to the Annual Meeting. This year the Annual Meeting will be Wednesday, **September 9, 2026**. Requests for petitions will begin **March 16, 2026** and can be provided by contacting the Cooperative. Petitions must be returned to the Cooperative office by **4 p.m. June 11, 2026**.

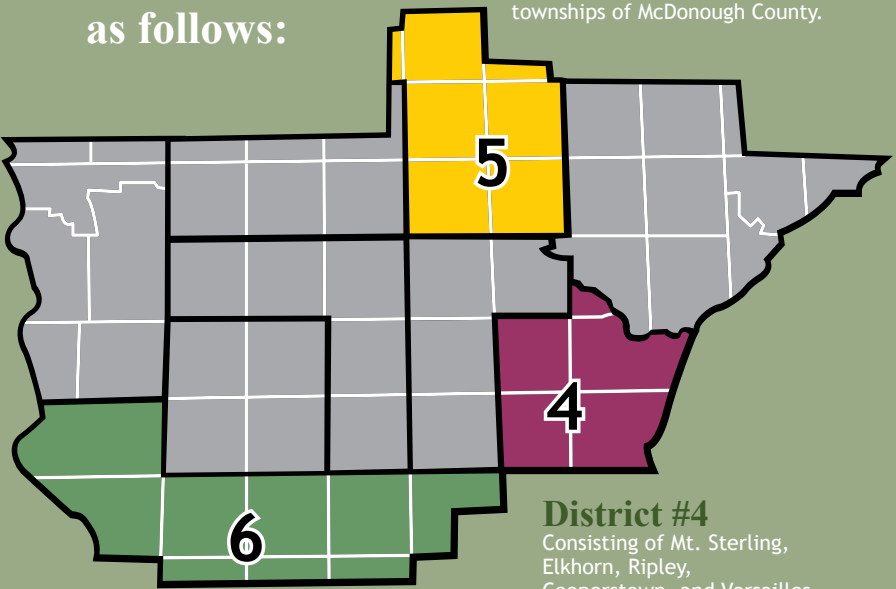
A list of nominations will be posted in the lobby of the Cooperative office within 30 days following the petition deadline. The Secretary shall be responsible for mailing to each member at least 30 days before the date of the Annual Meeting, a statement of the number of Board Members to be elected and

the names and addresses of the candidates nominated in each district.

The Secretary shall be responsible for mailing with the Notice of the Annual Meeting, or separately, but at least five days before the date of the Annual Meeting, a statement of the number of members to be elected and the names and addresses of the candidates. The names of the candidates shall be arranged by district.

The Cooperative is divided into nine districts of representation of membership and each district is represented by one director. Directors serve three-year terms. Their terms in office are staggered so that three of the nine directors are elected each year.

Director districts to be elected in 2026 are as follows:



District #5

Consisting of St. Mary township of Hancock County; Birmingham, Camden, Huntsville, and Brooklyn townships of Schuyler County; Bethel and LaMoine townships of McDonough County.

District #4

Consisting of Mt. Sterling, Elkhorn, Ripley, Cooperstown, and Versailles townships of Brown County.

District #6

Consisting of Melrose, Fall Creek, Payson, Richfield, Beverly, and Quincy townships (south of Broadway St.) of Adams County; Kinderhook, Barry, Fairmount, and Hadley townships of Pike County.



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Analyzing Your Usage

High Bill Concerns

We are happy to assist members with usage concerns and billing questions.

Before contacting us, please take a moment to read through the information below to help determine how your energy dollars are being spent.



How's the weather?

Heating and cooling your home can account for as much as 50 percent of your total energy use. So, it makes sense that during periods of extreme heat or cold, the additional load will cause an increase in electric use. Adding space heaters, electric fireplaces, livestock heaters, or vehicle block heaters can dramatically increase your energy consumption. Running dehumidifiers, pool pumps, or that refrigerator in the garage during the summer months, will also add to your electric bill.

I wasn't home...

If you leave your home for an extended period of time for business or vacation, any appliance you leave plugged in or connected will continue to use electricity even while you are gone. Your hot water heater, freezer, refrigerator, HVAC system, landscape irrigation, well pump, pool pump, etc. keep on running when you're not home. Before you leave, make sure to turn off or unplug appliances that aren't needed and adjust your thermostat to help keep heating and cooling costs down.

My neighbor's bill is much lower...

No two households use energy the same way, so comparing your energy bill to your neighbor's is like comparing apples to oranges. It's best to compare your current use to your past use. Consider the following:

- Has the size of your household increased?
- Have you added a new swimming pool or hot tub?
- Have you had overnight guests?
- Do you have an aquarium?
- Did you renovate or add on to your home recently?
- Is there an RV or camper in use?

Lighting and Appliances

Lighting, refrigeration, cooking, electronics, and appliances can account for nearly half of the total energy use in a typical household.

The location of refrigerators and freezers is very important. Never place a refrigerator or freezer in direct sunlight or in unconditioned spaces such as a breeze-

way, garage, or out-building. A fridge in a 90 degree environment, for example, uses nearly 50 percent more power than one in a 70 degree environment.

If you do have an extra refrigerator or freezer in use, put it in a conditioned space and keep it as full as possible. Frozen or cold items in the refrigerator or freezer help keep other items cool, reducing the amount of work your refrigerator has to do to maintain lower temperatures.

Still hanging on to that old refrigerator? Consider getting rid of it. Old refrigerators, especially those bought before 1993, use more than twice as much electricity as a new Energy Star model.

Is something wrong with my meter?

Meters are often blamed for a higher bill but are rarely the cause. Meters used by Adams Electric are tested before being put into service. The meters are reliable and extremely accurate. That's why, instead of focusing on the meters, we start by assisting members in finding what's using the power.

Still have questions?

If you still don't understand how and why you're using the amount of electricity you're using, try taking inventory of EVERYTHING that is plugged in and drawing power. Write this information down before you call the Cooperative and we can help you better understand how your energy dollars are being spent. We may even be able to offer some tips on how your home can be more efficient.

View Your Usage!

1. Visit adamselectric.coop to view your usage. The "My Account" button in the upper left corner leads you to the Member Portal where you can access your personal account to pay your bill, track your usage, and set up alerts.

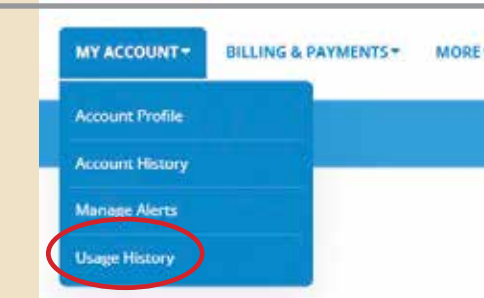


If you've never viewed your account before, you'll need to "Create User ID" the first time. You'll need your full account number and the last 4 digit of the phone number we have on file. This will allow you to set a username and password which you can use to login to the Member Service Portal. This same username and password can be used to login to the Member Link App if you'd like to access your account from your phone or tablet.



2. Once you reach the Member Portal, click "Sign In".

3. Click "My Account" on the Member Portal.



4. Select "Usage History".

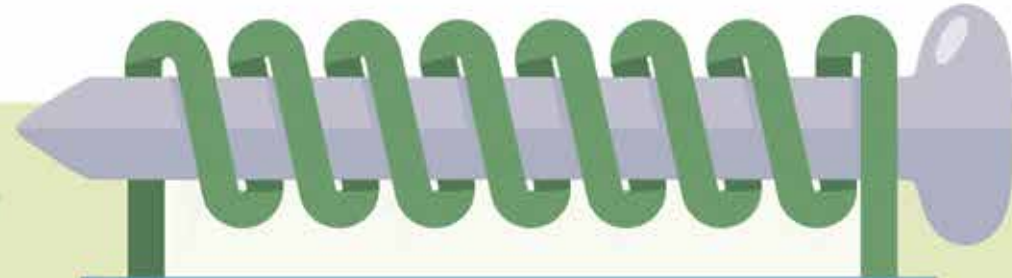


You'll see options to view 1 week at a time up to 2 years. The blue dots represent the highest temperature and the green dots represent the lowest temperature each day. When you hover over each day, you'll see the total kWhs and the temperatures indicated by the dots. Most likely, you'll notice in the winter that your usage (blue bars) go up when the temperatures get colder. In the summer, you'll see the temperatures go up along with the blue bars indicating the higher usage is likely due to air conditioning. If something looks odd, consider what day of the week it was. Were there more people home? What activities were you or the others in your home doing that day? Were there appliances in use that might have caused the increase? Also, consider comparing your usage from a specific day this year to the same day last year. You'll find this option in the blue bar just below the graph.

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Ham & Green Beans

Salt & pepper to taste

Cook ham in instant pot for 25 minutes, quick release. Shred ham. Add all remaining ingredients into instant pot. Cook for 5 more minutes, quick release.

Peach Cobbler Muffins

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 cup granulated sugar
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup unsalted butter, melted
1 large egg
1 tsp. vanilla extract
3 cups peeled and sliced fresh peaches

Peach Crumble Topping:
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup all-purpose flour
1 tsp. ground cinnamon
1/4 cup unsalted butter, melted

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Line a 12 cup muffin tin with paper liners. In a large bowl, whisk together the 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, 1 cup granulated sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. In a separate bowl, whisk together milk, 1/4 cup melted butter, egg, and vanilla. Add wet ingredients to the dry ingredients. Stir until just combined. Do not overmix. Gently fold in 2 cups of the sliced peaches. In a medium bowl, combine 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup flour, and cinnamon. Stir in remaining 1 cup sliced peaches and 1/4 cup melted butter. Fill the muffin cups about 2/3 full with the batter. Top each muffin with a spoonful of the peach crumble mixture. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Let the muffins cool in the tin for a few minutes before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

Clementine Cake

18 small clementines
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
2/3 cup vegetable oil
12 oz. orange yogurt
3 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
2 1/2 cups cake flour
2 1/2 tsp. baking powder
3/4 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. salt
10 oz. mini chocolate chips, optional
Powdered sugar for dusting

Cut two 14" circles of parchment paper and place in two 9" round cake pans so the edges of the parchment are well above the sides of the pans. Peel clementines and cut in half. (You can use tangerines, but be sure to remove seeds. Clementines are not supposed to have seeds.) Place enough halves, cut side down, in each pan to cover the bottoms. You may not use all the clementines, depending upon their size. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix remainder of ingredients well (except powdered sugar for dusting). Divide batter in half, and carefully and evenly smooth batter over clementines. Bake 50 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Cool for handling. Revert cakes onto serving plates. Dust with powdered sugar and cut into individual wedges. Refrigerate IF there are any leftovers.

Chocolate Spritz Cookies

3/4 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg, well beaten
2 cups flour
1/4 tsp. salt
2 Tbsp. milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla
2 squares chocolate, melted
Varicolored candy shot

Cream shortening. Stir in sugar, beat until fluffy. Add egg, salt, melted chocolate, milk, vanilla, and flour. Shape into balls (about 1/2 to 1 tsp. each). Roll in candy shot. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake 10 minutes at 375°F.



Angie's Chicken Chili

2-3 chicken breasts
1 jar salsa
1 cup (or less) water
1 lg. can chili beans
2 cans stewed tomatoes, cut up
1 can light red kidney beans
1 can black beans
2 sm. cans Mexi-corn

Place chicken breasts in crockpot, top with 1 jar salsa. Add some water (less than 1 cup) to ensure chicken doesn't dry out. Cook on low for 6-8 hours (or high for 3-4 hours). Shred chicken and return to crockpot with salsa. Add remaining ingredients and more water (if needed). Cook an additional 2-4 hours on low.
