Lineworker's Scholarship Deadline Approaching

The LaVern and Nola McEntire Lineworker's Scholarship helps pay for costs to attend the lineworker's school conducted by the Association of Illinois Electric Cooperatives (AIEC) in conjunction with Lincoln Land Community College (LLCC), Springfield.

The \$3,000 scholarship is awarded annually to an individual who meets one of the following criteria: is the son or daughter of a rural electric cooperative member in Illinois; is related to a rural electric cooperative employee or director in Illinois; is enrolled in the LLCC lineworker's school; or has served or is serving in the U.S. Armed Forces or National Guard. The applicant must have a high school diploma or GED at the time the scholarship is awarded.

The scholarship is awarded based on an essay, biographical statement, references, and a recommendation.

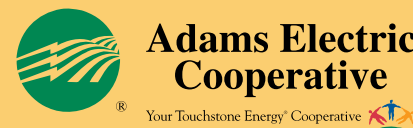

Managing your account from our Member Link App is easier than ever! Now, you can create your account directly from the app.

Simply download the app from the **App Store** or **Google Play** and search for "**Member Link**". (Make sure the icon looks like our icon!)



Once you open the app, tap the red "**Menu**" button and select "**New User**". You'll be asked to enter your **full account number** (found on your electric bill) and the **last four digits of your phone number** that's on file with Adams Electric. This information securely connects the app to your account. Next, create a **username and password** to complete your setup.

After logging in to the app, your account will appear on the home screen. Click the **red arrow** next to your account to view additional details.

From there, you can:

- **Pay your bill**
- **Report an outage**
- **View your energy usage**

You can pay your account balance, view your payment history, view PDFs of your previous bills, and even set up auto pay with credit card or E-check.

Also, under the menu options, you can **Report an Outage**. This will take you to an option to enter your phone number and choose if you want a callback after power has been restored, then click the white "**Report an Outage**" button. If you prefer, there's a link to our phone number at the top to call in your outage.

Another convenient feature is the **Outage Map**, which you can access from the menu button. You'll be able to see if you're likely part of a larger outage. (It's still important to report your outage to help us better manage outage restoration.)

The app also provides detailed usage graphs, allowing you to view daily, monthly, and hourly data including kilowatt-hour usage alongside daily temperatures. These tools make it easier to track your energy use and better understand your electric consumption.

Select "**My Alerts**" to set various notifications and the method you'd like them to be sent (Additional alerts can be set up on your account on our website at adamselectric.coop.)

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ENERGY EFFICIENCY TIP OF THE MONTH

As spring arrives, take advantage of milder temperatures to save energy at home. Open windows on pleasant days to bring in fresh air instead of running your HVAC system. It's also a great time to replace dirty air filters, which helps your system run more efficiently and improves indoor air quality. As daylight increases, turn off unnecessary lights and rely on natural sunlight when possible. Small seasonal adjustments like these can reduce energy use, lower monthly bills and help keep your home comfortable as winter transitions into spring.



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TORNADO & SAFETY & Electrical Hazards

As your local electric distribution cooperative, keeping the lights on is our job — but keeping our members safe is our priority. Tornadoes can cause widespread damage to homes, businesses, and electrical infrastructure in just minutes. Knowing what to do before, during, and after a storm can protect your family and help restore power quickly and safely.

During a Tornado: Safety First

When a warning is issued:

- Go to your designated safe space immediately.
- Stay away from windows and exterior walls.
- Protect your head and neck with blankets, pillows, or a mattress.
- Do not attempt to drive away from a tornado unless evacuation is directed well in advance.
- If you are outside and cannot reach shelter, lie flat in a low area and cover your head.

After the Storm: Electrical Safety Is Critical

Tornadoes often damage power lines, poles, and equipment. What you do next matters.

Treat All Downed Lines as Energized

Never approach or touch a downed power line — even if it appears inactive. Electricity can travel through water, debris, and even the ground around the line.

If you see a downed line:

- Stay at least 30 feet away.
- Keep others away.
- Call your electric cooperative immediately or dial 911 in an emergency.

Use Generators Safely

Portable generators can save the day — but only when used properly:

- Never run a generator indoors or in a garage.
- Keep it at least 20 feet from your home.
- Never plug it directly into a wall outlet (this can backfeed electricity and endanger lineworkers).
- Use a transfer switch installed by a qualified electrician.

Avoid Standing Water

Flooded areas may conceal energized lines or electrical equipment.

Why Restoration Takes Time

After a tornado, crews assess damage and restore power in stages:

- Transmission lines
- Substations
- Main distribution lines
- Individual neighborhoods
- Single-service lines to homes

We prioritize repairs that restore power to the greatest number of members first. Safety inspections must be completed before power can be safely re-energized.

When to Call an Electrician

If your home's weatherhead, meter base, or service mast is damaged, you may need a licensed electrician to make repairs before we can reconnect service.

If you're unsure, contact us — we're happy to guide you.

We're Your Cooperative

As a member-owned electric cooperative, we live and work in the communities we serve. During severe weather events, our crews work long hours — often in dangerous conditions — to restore power safely and efficiently.

Before a Tornado: Be Prepared

Tornadoes can develop quickly, especially during severe thunderstorms. Preparation is key.

1. Know the difference

Tornado Watch – Conditions are favorable.

Tornado Warning – A tornado has been spotted or indicated by radar. Take shelter immediately.

2. Build an emergency kit

Include:

- Flashlights (not candles)
- Extra batteries
- Portable phone charger or power bank
- First aid kit
- Bottled water
- Battery-powered weather radio

3. Identify a safe shelter area

The safest place is:

- A basement
- A storm shelter
- An interior room on the lowest floor, away from windows

Avoid mobile homes if possible — seek sturdier shelter in advance.

4. Secure outdoor items

Loose items can become dangerous projectiles and damage power lines or transformers.

Final Reminder

You can help by:

- Staying clear of work zones
- Reporting outages through official channels
- Keeping your contact information updated

Storms are unpredictable — but preparation saves lives.

- Stay informed.
- Stay prepared.
- Stay safe.

If you have questions about storm preparedness or generator safety, contact your local electric cooperative anytime. We're here for you — before, during, and after the storm.

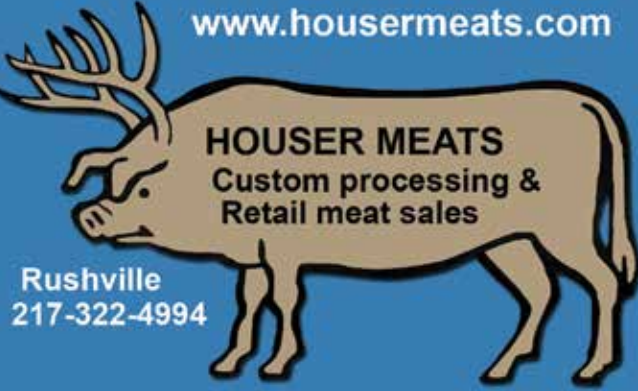
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Chicken Cordon Bleu

- 3 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut in half (like you're butterflying, but finish the cut)
- 12 slices deli honey ham
- 1 cup Panko bread crumbs
- 2 Tbsp. butter, melted
- 1/2 lb. thinly sliced Swiss cheese

Parmesan-Dijon Cream Sauce:

- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 1 cup milk
- 1 chicken bouillon cube, crushed
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 Tbsp. Dijon mustard
- 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 cup finely grated Parmesan cheese
- Parsley, for garnish if desired

Coat a 9x13 pan with cooking spray. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a medium bowl, combine bread crumbs and 2 Tbsp. melted butter; set aside. Layer chicken in baking dish. (Unlike traditional CCB, there is no second layer of chicken in this dish.) Top each breast with slices of ham, and slices of Swiss cheese, so that the entire breast is covered. Sprinkle bread crumbs over the top. Bake for 30-35 minutes, or until the chicken is cooked through (clear juices), the cheese is bubbly, and the bread crumbs are golden brown. While the chicken bakes, melt 2 Tbsp. butter in a medium sauce pan over medium heat. Whisk in the flour to form a roux, cook for 1-2 minutes. Slowly pour in milk while whisking, make sure there are no clumps. Stir in bouillon and salt. Whisk constantly, until the mixture begins to thicken, about 5-7 min. Remove from heat and stir in mustard, Worcestershire sauce, and Parmesan cheese. Stir until cheese is melted. Keep the sauce warm. Remove chicken from oven, plate, and top with sauce.

Crazy Banana Cake with Cream Cheese Icing

Cake:

- 1 1/2 cups very ripe bananas (3 fresh or 4 thawed, previously frozen)
- 2 tsp. lemon juice
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 3/4 cup soft butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 1/2 cups buttermilk (OR milk soured with 1 Tbsp. vinegar or lemon juice)

Frosting:

- 1/2 cup softened butter
- 8 oz. cream cheese, room temp.
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 3 1/2 cups powdered sugar

Pre-heat oven to 275 degrees F. Spray 9x13 cake pan. Mash bananas, mix with lemon juice, and set aside. In a med. bowl, mix flour, baking soda, and salt. Set aside. If you're making your own buttermilk, combine milk and vinegar (or lemon juice) in a small bowl, and set aside. In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Stir in vanilla. Beat in flour mixture alternately with buttermilk. Stir in bananas. Pour into cake pan and bake 1 hour and 10 mins. (or until knife comes out clean). *Cook longer, if needed, checking every 10 minutes until cake is fully cooked. Immediately place in freezer for 45 minutes (If not completely cool upon removal from freezer, let cool further before icing). For frosting, cream butter and cream cheese. Beat in vanilla and powdered sugar on low until combined, then high until smooth. Frost cake and enjoy! Note: One bite of this incredibly moist banana cake with cream cheese icing will have them begging for more. The way you bake and cool it is kind of crazy, but that's the secret to this cake's success.

Banana Cake

Cake:

- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3 bananas
- 1 cup Miracle Whip
- 1 cup water
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup black walnuts, crushed

Frosting:

- 4 cups powdered sugar
- 1/2 stick margarine
- Pinch of salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- Cold coffee
- Black walnuts, crushed for topping

Mix flour, baking soda, sugar, and salt. Set aside. Mash bananas in a large bowl. Add Miracle Whip, water, vanilla, and black walnuts. Pour cake mix into two 8" round pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Mix together powdered sugar, margarine, salt, and vanilla. Add cold coffee to desired thickness. Frost cooled cake. Sprinkle with crushed black walnuts. Warm Bacon Cheese Spread

- 1 round loaf sourdough bread
- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1 1/2 cups (12 oz.) sour cream
- 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 3/4 lb. sliced bacon, cooked & crumbled
- 1/2 cup chopped green onions
- Assorted crackers

Cut the top off the loaf of bread; carefully hollow out the bottom, leaving a 1-inch shell. In a mixing bowl, beat the cream cheese. Add sour cream, cheddar cheese, and Worcestershire sauce until combined; stir in bacon and onions. Spoon into bread shell and place top back on. Wrap in heavy aluminum foil. Bake at 325 for 1 hour or until heated through. Cut the removed bread into cubes. Serve with crackers and bread.
